According to the future District Governor, through joint partnership with CapraCare, the Global Birthing Home Foundation and Maison de Naissance in Torbeck, Haiti, the plan is to implement such a site in Torbeck in a birthing home that up to now has been dedicated to maternal care.

Heppermann also mentioned the need to vaccinate boys and girls against the HPV virus that causes cervical cancer.

"As a part of Global Grant number two, we want to lay the groundwork to make vaccination happen," said Rotarian Heppermann.

Summing up the importance of efforts being made to eliminate cervical cancer in Haiti, she said, "I'm reminded on a regular basis, that every now and then, ordinary people are given an opportunity to do extraordinary things and this is one of them. We're not done. We can save lives. Join us and you can too."

Ribbon Cutting



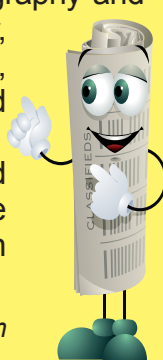
