The class, under the instruction of Steven Thomas, has been meeting Tuesday and Thursday nights since March 5 with 15 students enrolled.

Instruction has included oxy-fuel and plasma cutting, and stick, MIG, and TIG welding of steel and aluminum.

The local tech center partnered with Elizabethtown Community and Technical College Department of Workforce Solutions to offer the class.

Students upon completing the requirements will be given the opportunity to become certified welders through the American Welding Society.

The Gas Metal Arc Welding certification will provide greater opportunities for those seeking employment.
