Reed speaks of legislative session accomplishments

Kentucky State Representative Brandon Reed, who represents the people of Green, LaRue and Marion Counties in the state legislature, informed Greensburg Rotary members May 21 about a number of successes coming from the recent legislative

session held this year. They included SB1 and HB1, referred to as the School Safety and Resiliency Act, that would enhance

the safety of our school children; and HB 46, sponsored by

Representative Reed, that would place the national motto of "In God We Trust" in all public schools within the state, beginning the new school year of 2019-2020.

In speaking about the recent legislative session, he said, "We took some pride in fixing a couple of things."

Nonprofit organizations/groups will be able to conduct events/ fundraisers without paying taxes on the monies earned and efforts are being made to improve our state's

infrastructure.

Reed said, "We're trying to replace some bridges; We're trying to resurface some roads."

The state representative noted that there are currently some 15,000 more jobs available in Kentucky than people ready to fill those jobs.

Referring to the state's pension system, he said, "There's eight retirement systems in the Commonwealth of Kentucky.

Reed noted that today's retirees are living longer than when

the pension system was first established, which has affected the stability of the state's retirement systems.

He said, "Now there's about two retirees, almost three, for every person working. I'm trying to take care of the retiree, take care of the person that's working now, but we're going to have to look at a new system for new hires."

Green County's state representative said, "We have a \$40 billion pension deficit."

He noted that this

affects the state's bond rating as well as the state's ability to bor-

row money. Observing three state retirement systems, Representative Reed said that teacher retirement is about 58 percent funded, regular state employee retirement, around 13 percent, and county employee retirement some 60 percent

Summing up the pension system, the 24th District State Representative said, "It's not only a funding issue; it's a mechanism problem."
