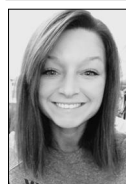
Thankfully, my hair is stick-straight and you can't tell and no one actually sees my face or feet here at the office.

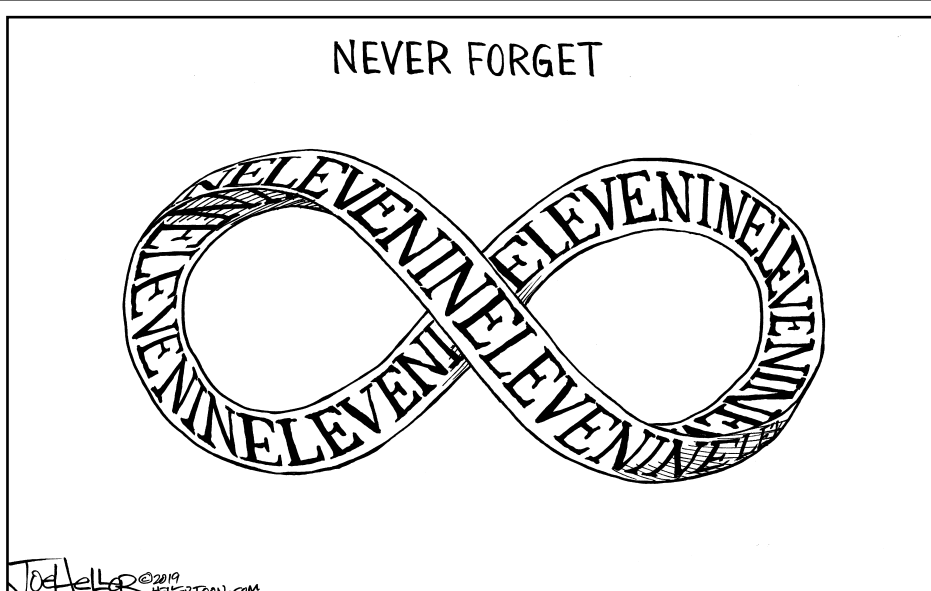
So back to town we took our dogs to be safe in the fenced in "old" yard.
