It is time. Clean out that medicine cabinet

Spring cleaning takes on an entirely new meaning when getting ride of expired or unsafe medicines. Even though people may be quick to toss out expired foods or even clean closets of ill-fitting clothing, few individuals exercise such diligence with their medicine cabinets.

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration says the medicine expiration date is critical when determining if a product is safe to use and will work as intended. Medications past their expiration date may not be as strong as intended, and even their chemical composition may change, making them risky to keep around. Furthermore, keeping too many medications in a home - particularly pain prescriptions - can lead to misuse and abuse, as the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration says that rates of prescription drug abuse in the United States have risen considerably in recent years.

Some old medications, such as children's cough and cold products, may no longer be recommended for certain ages.

Taking inventory

and cleaning out medicine cabinets frees up space and creates a safe home environment.

· Toss away any expired products, whether they are prescription or over-the-counter medicines. The best way to do so is to bring the medication to a pharmacy for disposal rather than throwing it in the garbage or flushing medicines down the toilet.

· Discard any unmarked containers or pill foils that are not in their original packaging.

· Test any medical devices, such as a nebulizer, blood pressure monitor and glucose testing equipment to ensure they are in working order.

· Replenish commonly used items, such as fever reducers or headache medicines.

· Relocate medical supplies to an area that isn't high in humidity, as steam from showers can speed up the expiration of medication. Storing medicines in the refrigerator won't help, as that is a high-humidity area, too.

Checking medications and removing expired products from the house can prevent accidents related to medications and ensure that all medicines in the house are as effective as possible.

Dept. for Public Health hosts Children's Poster Contest; deadline is October 4

The Department for Public Health (DPH), within the Cabinet for Health and Family Services (CHFS), is inviting school-age children Kindergarten through 8th grade across the Commonwealth to create and submit original artwork for a chance to win cash prizes in a poster contest focusing on environmental health. This contest is sponsored by the Kentucky Environmental Public Health Tracking Network and Kentucky Population Health Institute.

Students in Kindergarten through 8th grade may submit a poster focusing on environmental health in Kentucky. Posters must include at least one of the following topics:

• Air quality and health

• Climate and health

• Built environment and health

• Physical activity and health

• Food and health

• First (\$100), second (\$75), and third (\$50) place overall winners will receive Visa gift cards. A winner from each grade also will be selected and awarded a \$25 gift card, and a drawing from all participants will be held and three names will be chosen to receive \$25 gifts cards. The winners' posters will be recognized at the annual Children's Environmental Health Summit to be held at the Center for Rural Development in Somerset, Kentucky on Oct. 10. Winners will

be contacted via email or phone on or before Oct. 10, 2019.

Entries will be judged on creativity, poster theme, topic and originality. Submissions for the poster can include any of the following media: crayon, marker, watercolor, tempera, acrylic, collage, or original photograph. Poster size should be 8.5" x 11". Submissions will be accepted from any Kentucky resident students in grades Kindergarten through 8th. Each participant may only submit one original poster. All posters become the property of DPH and may be used in fu-

ture disease prevention campaigns. Child name, grade, teacher, school and teacher contact information (address, phone and email) must be included on the back of the artwork.

Submissions will be accepted through Oct. 4, 2019. Entries must be postmarked by Oct. 4, and mailed to Shelly Canada (Poster Contest), Kentucky Department for Public Health, 275 E. Main Street, Division of Epidemiology and Health Planning HS2GW-C, Frankfort, KY 40621. A completed entry form must be taped or glued to the back of each entry.
