Young to run in 120 counties

Terry Young, a local 5K runner, has a goal of running at least one race in all 120 counties in Kentucky.

He has already competed in 74 different counties and is planning about 15 more counties before the end of the year and hopes to have run in every county by the end of 2020.

Young, who is now 51 years old, ran in Saturday's Cow Days 5K, and finished first in his age group.

"My wife (Janet) always goes with me," Young said, "and she is my photographer and my biggest cheerleader."

Young did not grow up as a runner.

"I played sports in middle school and high school," Young said, "and always enjoyed playing softball and football but was never a runner."

Young began competing in 2009 when

in every Kentucky county did not get its start until about two years ago when he met Ambrose Wilson, of Midway, Kentucky.

Wilson and some other runners were working on the idea of running in all counties and he encouraged Young to do the same.

So, in 2017 at the age of 49, Young began working toward the goal of running a race in all Kentucky counties when he competed in a 5K in Dawson Springs. In that race, he finished 8th overall and first in his age group.

"This has become more like a family now," Young said. "I love getting to meet people and talking to people and now at most races it's like seeing family again."

The biggest race that Young has competed in is the 2017 Ham Days 5K in Lebanon, Kentucky.

"There were 1,060 runners in that race and I finished 19th

overall and first in my age group," Young said.

Young, who works as a kitchen and bathroom remodeler with a Campbellsville, Kentucky company, can sometimes run two events in the same weekend.

"If the races are Friday and Sunday or Saturday and Sunday, then I can sometimes get in two races the same weekend," Young said. "I've worked all my life and now that our two children are grown, we are trying to enjoy life more by doing some of these fun things."

Young explained that the 5K races provide him and his wife with a mini-vacation almost every weekend as they try to look around at every community they are in and see any historical sites that are located there.

Charity races have become a favorite for Young.

Morgan, who had her first song on the charts in 1979, is well known in country music circles. She is the youngest member ever inducted into the Grand Ole Opry. She first appeared on the stage there at the age of 13, singing Paper Roses.

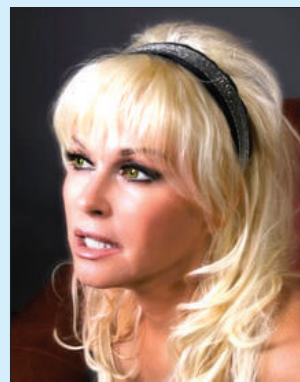
She has had three number one singles. Her first was Five Minutes. Her other top charting songs are What Part of No along with I Didn't Know My Own Strength.

Morgan's latest album release was in 2016 entitled Letting Go....Slow.

Her difficult life is reflected in much of her music, especially in the songs that she helped to write. One of her other familiar songs is I Guess You Had to Be There.

Morgan, a Nashville native, is a four time TNN/Music City News Vocalist of the Year. She won those honors in 1994, 1996, 1997 and 1998.
