In addition, local fifth graders were presented the opportunity to hear her story.

Hall noted that the Arts Council plans to make available other DVD's in the future featuring a variety of additional local topics.

In 2009, the Council sponsored the Historic Homes Tour which was also held in 2011 and 2019.

In 2011, she mentioned that local quilt trail participants and their quilt exhibits were added to the Heartland Quilt Trail brochure.

The local group also established a Mary Lou Lingle Scholarship Fund, in honor of the late Arts Council member, by awarding a graduating senior whose plans are to pursue a profession in the Arts.

A recent project of

the Greensburg Arts Council was their \$1,000 donation, taken from proceeds of the Historic Homes Tour and Art in the Alley, toward restoration of the Old Courthouse.

President Hall said, "We're still striving to bring awareness to the community of how important Art in all forms is to everyone."
