Free KHEAA booklet for families college searching

Kentucky students and their families can get a free, personalized “Getting the Facts” report to help them choose the right college. The report is provided by the Kentucky Higher Education Assistance Authority (KHEAA). “Getting the Facts” provides estimates of how much the family can expect to spend and how much financial aid the student may receive. Students can get estimates for up to six colleges across the United States.

To get their free report, students must log into or set up an account at www.kheaa.com.

They should then select their state of residence, enter the date they expect to graduate from high school and click on the “Getting the Facts” link.

Students and parents must provide information about estimated income and assets, and students must provide their Social Security number to set up the account.

Lady Tigers place third at NCAA Championship

Lady Tiger golf took a mini step back in the second round of the NCCAA Championship and fell to third place entering the final round last Wednesday.

Campbellsville shot a 333 as a team and were jumped by Erskine College after they fired a new tournament-low score for a team, 317. They are now tied with Grace

College for the team lead.

Individually, Gracie Parrott shot a seven over 79 on the Ocean Course at Hammock Beach Resort. Parrott moves to solo fourth in the standings and is one of two Lady Tigers in the Top 6. Fellow Green County product April Houk shot an 83 in the second round and falls to sixth.

Abigail Coffey, Cortney Withrow and Ken-

dall Mills round out the top 5 for the Lady Tigers. Coffey improved in her second round with an 82 to be tied for 15th. Withrow shot an 89, improving her second-round score by one shot, and is tied for 24th along with Mills, which shot a 93 on Tuesday.

The Lady Tigers tee off on Wednesday in the final round of the championship at 8:50 a.m. ET with Mills teeing off first.

Parrott and Houk earn All-American Honors

Freshmen Gracie Parrott and April Houk finished with NCCAA Women’s Golf All-American honors at the national championship that finished last Wednesday afternoon.

Hammock Beach’s Ocean Course wasn’t very nice to the Lady Tiger golf program this week as the Campbellsville’s underclassmen struggled in the final round of the NCCAA Championship finishing in fourth place as a team.

The Lady Tigers shot 355 as a team to fall out of the Top 3 and had three scores in the 90s to finish the championship.

Parrott finished in fourth place to earn All-American honors after scores of 78, 79, 84. Houk finished in the Top 10 for her first national cham-

pionship appearance as well with scores of 78, 83, 86. The Top 10 in the field earn All-American honors.

Abigail Coffey placed solo 20th, while Kendall Mills finished tied for 24th. Rounding out Campbellsville was Cortney Withrow’s 27th place finish.

The Lady Tigers started the tournament with a solid score after round one

but dropped one spot on the team leaderboard each day. Grace College won the team championship, while Anna Parramore from Erskine College won individual medalist honors.

The Lady Tigers conclude their fall schedule and will hit the links again in February to start the spring portion of their competition season.
