This week, I want to tell you about the Indian hawthorn.

Some gardeners think Indian hawthorn is a ho-hum, nopizzazz shrub. But this plant is so much more than some of the prima donna shrubs that garner all the attention each spring. An accurate way to describe these shrubs is to say they are hard-working don't complain much about how they're treated. They are so pedestrian, so blue collar.

But when you actually look for them, you'll find Indian hawthorns are in almost every south Mississippi landscape as foundation anchor shrubs. That's because fantastic backdrop for warmthey're reliable, and every season annual color. The top

ability in their landscape. The Indian Hawthorn is the perfect evergreen shrub to plant in your home landscape in hardiness zones 7a through 10.

Star-shaped flowers ranging from snow white to light-pastel pink emerge in the spring in clusters held loosely at the ends of branches. On calm springs days, you may catch a hint of their delicate floral fragrance when you stroll by a hedge in bloom. The pistil and stamens are reddish, matching the color of the newly unfolding foliage. This feature adds additional interest and contrast to the flower color.

will be more engaged than ever in ensuring the future of Mississippi's turkey flock. Beginning with the 2019 season, all turkey hunters are required to report their harvests to the Mississippi Department of Wildlife, Fisheries, and Parks (MD-WFP) by 10:00 p.m. on the day the turkey is harvested. The new MDWFP Game Check system provides hunters with three available options to report their bird: the MDWFP hunting and fishing smartphone app, www.mdwfp.com/gamecheck, or by calling 1-800-BE-SMART.

"Game Check is going to give us information that we have never had before, including county-specific harvest numbers," said MDWFP Wild Turkey Biologist Adam Butler. "Over time, the trends we will see through Game Check data will allow MDWFP to make more informed decisions, which will in turn translate into better management of turkey populations," Butler continued.

Hunters should be prepared to begin the Game Check process before mov-

This spring, Mississippi the field, and then complete hunters who bag a gobbler the harvest reporting process later in the day by logging into the website or calling the reporting hotline.

Harvest reporting has broad support among Mississippi's 45,000 licensed turkey hunters. Surveys show more than 75% of this group favors such a system. The approach should be familiar to hunters who have hunted turkey outside the Magnolia State. MDWFP officials modeled Game Check from the process used in other states, specifically Alabama's recent adoption of harvest reporting in 2016.

The MDWFP hunting and fishing app is free from the Apple or Android store. A standard. downloadable MDWFP harvest record is available from the MDWFP website, or the hunter may choose to create their own.

New report reinforces lifesaving benefits of smoke alarms

National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) confirms the importance of having working smoke alarms in your home. According to the NFPA report, almost three out of five home fire deaths happened in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

"We can't underscore enough how critical it is to have properly installed and operating smoke alarms. The early warning from a smoke alarm provides precious time to get out and can be the difference between life and death," said Lorraine Carli, NFPA's vice president of Outreach and Advocacy. Carli added that this is important in that you could have as little as two minutes to escape. "Modern construction and furnishings in homes burn faster and hotter, making seconds count."

The report further stated that the risk of dying in reported home structure fires is 54 percent lower in homes with working smoke alarms than in homes with no alarms or none that worked.

NFPA provides several smoke alarm safety tips:

• A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire. Install smoke alarms in every sleeping room and outside each separate sleeping area. Install alarms on every level of the home.

· Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.

Smoke alarms should be interconnected. When one sounds, they all sound.

· Test all smoke alarms at

oxide combined. • Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.

· People who are hard-ofhearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.

• Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

When a smoke alarm sounds, get outside and stay outside. • Replace all smoke alarms

ing their bird from the harvest location. For hunters who choose to take advantage of the smartphone app, the entire reporting process will be completed before leaving the woods, even if the user is without cellular coverage.

"We strongly encourage hunters to take advantage of the MDWFP hunting and fishing app if they have a smartphone, Butler added. "It's a one-stop-shop for harvest reporting."
