Law enforcement agencies Holmes County Sheriff's Department, Mississippi Bureau of Investigations and the Holmes County Con-Mississippi Highway Patrol are continuing an investigation for answers in the shooting of a 10-year-old boy.

On Wednesday evening, March 27, a bus transporting elementary and middle school students in the Mileston area was the target of an alleged drive-by shooting.

According to Holmes County Sheriff Willie March, a high powered rifle was used in the incident. "The

The bullet from an unidentified shooter entered the bus just under the window of an unoccupied seat and struck the hand of a 10-year-old
