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New train rolls into Clinton Depot; caboose to follow

The dream of a train to carry passengers around Olde Towne Clinton became a reality a few weeks ago, when an engine and four passenger cars rolled into Clinton. According to Anna Boyd, Assistant Director of Main Street Clinton, who operates the Clinton Depot, Mayor Phil Fisher tried for several years to find funding for a land train. A land train looks like a regular train, but has tires instead of train wheels and can travel on city streets.

"When we saw a similar train at the Agriculture and Forestry Museum in Jackson, we realized we could have one built just like we wanted," Boyd said. John Jacobsen designed the train at the Ag Museum and provided a "wealth of knowledge for us." Jacobsen, a board member of the Mississippi Agriculture and Forestry Museum Foundation, helped Boyd and others to get the Depot museum going in Clinton, providing assistance with the model train displays and much more.

Independent Metal Craft in Clinton fabricated the train by using Jacobsen's design and also applying their own special brand of ingenuity. Dee Warren, the owner and president of Independent Metal Craft, or IMC, said his crew was given a Kubota tractor to use for the train's engine.

"We stripped it down and clad it in metal to make it look like a locomotive," he said. "We designed and built the fender well, a barrel shape for the front of the train, and made all of it removable."

The engine's exhaust and cooling system had to be reworked, and the design had to be as safe as possible. Joey LaRue did all of the metal fabrication,

and Dylan Butler handled all of the painting.

When asked if building a train was an unusual project for IMC, Warren said: "It seems like our shop always gets unusual projects."

The cars for the city's train were constructed using a base of four small trailers.

"We redesigned them, installed

stainless steel seats, and put a canopy on top." On Friday, April 5, IMC was working on the final car for the train, a handicap-accessible caboose. Warren explained that the trailer is being redesigned to drop down lower in the back to accommodate a sort of drawbridge that will lower to allow wheelchairs to board the caboose.

The train pulls four passenger cars plus the handicap-accessible caboose behind it. The passenger cars accommodate four to six adults or six to eight children, Boyd said.

"It will be used mostly at city special events, some at the park, some Main Street and some Depot events."

The Depot hosts monthly reading events for kids called the Reading Railroad. Children read a book and do a craft. Beginning in May, after reading a book and doing a craft, kids will get to go for a short train ride through Olde Towne.

During city events, particularly during park events, the train will serve as a shuttle. The train is also available for rent by nonprofit organizations for public events within the city limits, Boyd said.

"The train will be a great asset for City use," said Mayor Phil Fisher. "It will take people from Traceway to Olde Towne when brick street events
