Besides some scenic walking through non-prairie forest and woodland or the combined 100 acres of fields and grassland, or simply bird-watching in the scenic natural beauty gives visitors to Rinquelin Trail Lake Conservation Area a variety of choices while spending time there. Missouri Department of Conservation oversees the preservation of this spot as part of their Central Missouri and Ozark region.

Acquired via five separate transactions between 1982 and 1990, the area consists of 286 acres of woodland, fields, and lake, and is named after an Indian trail that passed through Vienna and connected the Gasconade and Osage Rivers.

The lake area, "nestled in the Ozark highlands at the headwaters of the Little Maries River," (as described on the website), includes a concrete boat ramp, fishing jetty, and a doubt-pit privy, all disability-accessible, with two other fishing jetties, as well. Fishermen are provided ample prospects to catch bass, catfish, and sunfish (Bluegill and Redear) and the Missouri Department of Conservation restocks the lake with catfish each fall. There is also an intermittent stream on the site that is approximately one mile long.

Individual primitive campsites are available next to one of the parking lots; no camping amenities are provided,

grassland and old fields, those who enjoy bird-watching can find a variety of fowl on the premises. Obtaining a copy of the Audubon Society of Missouri Conservation Area Bird List will aid in this quest. Opportunities for outdoor photography and wildlife viewing are also possible. Wildlife habitat management involves disturbing old fields, planting native grasses, harvesting timber, and includes establishing annual food plots. Rabbit, squirrel, turkey, and deer hunting are permitted in the designated areas. However, deer hunters should only use archery and muzzle-loader methods.

Located in the Central region of Missouri, in southwestern Maries County, the Rinquelin Trail Community Lake and accompanying acreage can be easily accessed from Dixon. Travel north on Highway 133, then west on Highway DD, then south on County Road 631, and east on County Road 630 to the area entrance. Three main parking lots, accommodating a total of 26 vehicles allow ample parking space for visitors, in addition to the parking lot near the primitive camping area. The conservation area is open for public use from 4:00 am to 10:00 pm daily. For more information, call (573) 815-7900. 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
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A Country Hideaway in the Ozark Hills!
