"Having three girls in the house, including my two daughters, is a bit interesting sometimes, particularly in the morning getting ready for school, but overall they are getting along very well," said Oratch. "They are very busy, and Ana is not used to this craziness."

Oratch explained the many factors to consider when deciding on an exchange student.

"We have to take many things into consideration, including religion, dietary preferences, pets and cultural differences," said Oratch. "In her video about her interest in the program, Ana said she wanted a sister her age, and my daughter is a month and a half younger than Ana, so that was a good fit."

Ana explained the differences between the Spanish and American school system.

"We have 12 years of schooling, and then we go on to college," said Ana. "I want to go to college, and my favorite subjects back home are physics and chemistry, and here my favorite class is gym.

"In Spain we start school at 9:30 in the morning and we are finished at 5 p.m.," she explained. "Then we have sports from 6 to 7 p.m. and when I have tennis, I play from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m."
