Going through the cancer process forces one to take a good look at what is really important in life. Often, words of wisdom come from someone who has come through the process.

with in the past to put something than to put your head down and barrel through it," Rudh commented. "There are no short cuts and hopefully you have the support I've had because it would be daunting alone.



106th Clay County Fair Opens Thursday





Back again this year is ever popular demolition derby. There will be four classes with a payout of over \$5,000.

It's nearly mid-July, which means Clay County Fair is on the way with four days of great entertainment. There are activities galore for every age and interest at the 106th annual fair, which is held at the fairgrounds in Barnesville beginning Thursday, July 11 and continues through Sunday, July 14.

Since it started in 1914, the Clay County Fair has been a venue for exhibitors to showcase their talents, reconnect with neighbors, promote agricultural products and offer family-fun events. It's a time for 4-H and FFA members to showcase projects they have worked on in the past year. The fair is also an occasion to recognize individuals who help make the fair and community a viable place to play, work and live.

The fair officially kicks off on Thursday, July 11. Exhibitors living in and around the county will enter livestock, crops, garden produce, flowers and domestic goods for judging and display. The fair is the climactic summer event for members of Clay County 4-H clubs and FFA chapters. Free for the viewing are projects from members of these Natural Resource buildings.

The Clay County Fair features several events that preserve our county's agricultural heritage. Those include the livestock judging contests. Over the course of the fair, there are rabbit, poultry, cattle, swine, horse, goat and sheep shows. Refer to the fair's schedule for times and location of the livestock judging.

A Modified Tractor Pull will be at the grandstand Friday, July 12. Action begins at 6:30.

Speaking of big-wheeled farm equipment, the popular tractor parade rolls in about 2:00 p.m. on Saturday afternoon, July 13, owners of antiquated tractors and equipment proudly drive their farm machinery giving a nostalgic look from the past.

Stop by the Natural Resource Building and check out the tractor simulator. Sit in a cab and get a feel for what it is like to drive a tractor and plant a field. This building is also home to crop displays, a wildlife exhibit, a TIP trailer and vendors that promote agriculture.

Anything can happen at the ranch rodeo on Sunday, July 14. All of

> Four-person teams compete and demonstrate skills that are used in everyday cattle operations. Whether a horse decides to buck off its rider when preparing to rope a steer, or a contestant gets his winning lasso throw tangled in a horse's tail, the audience is well entertained. No animals are hurt during the competition. However, the same cannot be guaranteed about those participating.

> The demolition derby made a smashing return to the fair in 2017. Come out for an evening of crunches, and metal to metal crashes on Saturday, July 13.

> This year the demo derby will feature four classes: welded full size, limited wld full size, welded compacts and chain compacts. Total payout for the event is \$5,850.

> Back again this year is the 'Power Wheels Derby" for kids 4-8. Participants are to bring their own car and helmet. For more information on the Power Wheels Derby visit mnclaycountyfair.com.

The revving of engines and smashing of vehicles will begin in front of the grandstand at 6:30 p.m. This exciting event will include compact cars and pickups. Come and cheer your favorite driver.

New this year for the grandstands is the beer garden. It will be on the north end of the grandstand. A ticket much be purchased to the grandstand to be granted access to the beer garden.

Ticket price for each grandstand show is \$10 for those 12 years old and over and \$5 for children 11 years old and younger.

Besides all of the grandstand entertainment, the Clay County Fair offers much enjoyment at other places on the fairgrounds.

As always, Clay County Fair officials do their utmost to bring topnotch entertainment for all ages. The live performances begins on the first night of the fair, Thursday evening, with the talent show. Stoneridge Road takes the stage later that evening.

You'll have ample opportunity to enjoy magician Tom Anderson's show on Friday. He performs at 10 a.m., noon and 3:30 p.m. at the band shelter.

Sherwin Linton has been dazzling audiences for more than half a century. On Friday, July 12, Sherwin and his wife, Pam, will present two free performances, 5:30 and 7:30 p.m., at the grandstand's main stage.

An area family favorite, Penny & Pals, returns to the Clay County Fair on Saturday, July 13. The fun and music begins at 11:00 a.m. at the band shelter.

Clowning Around with Kim will start at 2:00 p.m. under the tent by the 4-H Annex Building.

The Red Letter Band will bring its chart topping sound to the band shelter on Saturday at 6:30 p.m. Tap your toes and sing along as six musicians sing classic country hits, inspirational songs and original tunes.

Test your ability when participating in a spelling bee at the old school house. Of course, the tradition continues with activities for the kids, such as 4-H Day Camp, ag olympics, nickel scramble, pedal

pull, pre-school fun corner and bike giveaways.

Chainsaw carving demonstrations will be at the Conservation Building Saturday from 11:00 a.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Sunday at the fair begins with two different church services and continues with award ceremonies. A Sunday awards program begins at 1:00 p.m. at the band shelter. Ron and Jane Salber and Gene Prim will be inducted to the Clay County Fair Hall of Fame. There will be recognition of the Clay County Senior Citizen and any century farms in the county.

A Best of Show Parade wraps up the summer festival.

The Mighty Thomas Carnival comes to the fairgrounds and will entertain boys and girls of all ages with their thrilling rides and enticing midway attractions. Six different

times are designated over the four days of the fair.

Advance tickets can be purchased at businesses throughout the county through Wednesday, July 10 to save money on the rides. A buddy day special will take place on Saturday, July 13 from 1:00 to 6:00 p.m.

Additional highlights at the Clay County Fair include Government Day, Learn By Doing Center, FFA barnyard, Daisy May, Pioneer Photography and bingo, among many, many other things.

There is something for everyone at the Clay County Fair. Come and experience all of the action, excitement, thrills and family fun that the fair offers in its four day run, July 11, 12, 13 and 14 in Barnesville.
