## LCA now providing mental health and family services in Menahga

Lake Country Associates (LCA) has been offering mental health and family services in Park Rapids and Bemidji for several years, and they are now providing some of those much-needed mental health and family services in Menahga.

At this time Melissa Stave and Hyacinth Mosse, LCA clinical staff, are providing mental health therapy Monday through Friday by appointment to individuals, families and couples in their new offices at the White Pine Center on Main Street NW in Menahga, located just across the street from the West Central Telephone Association (WCTA) building. The number to call in Menahga for appointments is (218) 564-9229.

Mosse said they express compassion and empathy in their counsel, and welcome anyone struggling with life's many issues to consider setting up an appointment. She has been working with people in the community since September and is currently counseling about seven individuals.

In addition to therapy sessions, the Menahga site is also, under Rule 25, providing substance abuse assessments and diagnostic assessments for mental health. The Menahga LCA site is also in the process of becoming fully licensed to provide high intensity outpatient treatment for adults struggling with substance abuse, which will include group therapy, wherein those receiving treatment will get together at regular times, up to three times a week.

Animal therapy is also available at the Menahga site, with "Buddha" the Bos-

They opened a two-room rental office in Park Rapids in April of 2010 and then moved to a newly renovated building at 515 Bridge Street in Park Rapids. As of the spring of 2017, Park Rapids also now has "The Cottage," which is a dropin center and home base for community mental health staff.

The general aim of LCA is three-fold: To serve residents in the community with "a locally owned and operated, financially stable mental health service provider;" to provide good paying jobs and positive work environment for staff; and to "serve our community and referral services through flexible, consumer-focused decision making that benefits the communities we serve."

LCA has offered community-based services including Adult Rehabilitative Mental Health Services (ARMHS) and Community Support Program (CSP).

The business expanded to "It's scary when people are a Bemidji office during the winter of 2015 under the direction of experienced clinician, supervisor and trainer Jessica Niemi. That office space and now offers more specialized services including Parent Child Interaction Therapy (PCIT) and Trauma-Informed Child Parent Psychotherapy (TICPP). That site now serves children, teens, adults and families.
