Court Proceedings

Dustin Merle Flynn, (28), 824 America Ave NW, Cass Lake, MN 56633

On March 25, 2019, at approximately 12:01 a.m., Deputy Kuhn responded to a cabin/residence on Wildwood Road, unit 3, for a report of domestic assault. The residence and surrounding area are located in Hubbard County. While in route Deputy Kuhn was informed Dustin Merle Flynn, the above named defendant had flipped the bed over in unit 3, which his girlfriend NG was lying in, causing NG to fall out of the bed. Deputy Kuhn was informed the above named defendant had a knife. Deputy Kuhn was also informed the above named defendant was taken to the hospital on March 24th after calling 911. The above named defendant reported children in the cabin walls.

Upon arrival Deputy Kuhn parked away from the cabin and approached by foot. While approaching the cabin Deputy Kuhn met and spoke with CO. CO stated NG was presently in unit 4, a nearby residence to unit 3. Deputy Kuhn then approached unit 3 and observed the above named defendant standing in the doorway of the cabin. Deputy Kuhn ordered the above named defendant to stay where he was for a safety pat down. The above named defendant complied and Deputy Kuhn patted the above named defendant down, finding five small white pills in the above named defendant's pocket. Deputy Kuhn identified the pills as Lorazepam, a schedule IV controlled substance.

Deputy Kuhn then responded to unit 4 and spoke with NG. NG stated she and the above named defendant live together and have been in a relationship for some time. NG stated she was lying in bed sleeping in the late hours of March 24th when the above named defendant flipped the bed. NG stated she does not know why the above named defendant flipped the bed. NG stated the above named defendant hit her by flailing his arms, as if to get her out of the way. NG stated the above named defendant had a knife and was using to get into the walls of the cabin. NG stated she does not have a prescription for Lorazepam and does not know where the above named defendant obtained the five pills.

Deputy Kuhn again spoke with the above named defendant. The above named defendant stated he flipped the bed over because of a trap door underneath that children were using to get into the walls. The above named defendant stated he saw a doctor earlier on the up, and it's clear that if male 24th and was cleared. The above named defendant stated he used methamphetamine earlier in the day. The above named defendant stated the pills belonged to his sister and could be transported back to where they belong by computer. While speaking to the above named defendant Deputy Kuhn observed dilated pupils

Michael Jonathon Johnson, (35), 14867 Rosebush Lane, Cass Lake, MN 56633 On March 17, 2019, at ap-

proximately 6:57 p.m., Deputy Anderson was patrolling eastbound on US Highway 2, in northern Hubbard County, when he observed a Chevy Trailblazer also traveling eastbound with a cracked windshield obstructing the driver's view. Deputy Anderson performed a traffic stop on the Trailblazer, stopping the vehicle on the Hubbard County/Cass County line.

Upon approaching the vehicle Deputy Anderson identified the driver as Michael Jonathon Johnson, the above named defendant. Deputy Anderson noted the vehicle was registered to the above named defendant. While explaining the reason for the traffic stop Deputy Anderson observed the above named defendant to have bloodshot and watery eyes. Deputy Anderson also observed the above named defendant to be fidgety and to have difficulty remaining still. Deputy Anderson suspected the above named defendant had ingested a mood altering substance.

Deputy Anderson observed one passenger in the vehicle, in the front passenger seat. Deputy Anderson observed the passenger to be sleeping, although the passenger's eyelids were moving. Deputy Anderson recognized the passenger as Alexander Hart and suspected he was attempting to avoid a warrant. Dispatch confirmed Hart had an active warrant in Cass County which Hart was placed in custody for.

While investigating the above named defendant's impairment, Deputy Anderson observed two open alcoholic beverage cans in the backseat of the Trailblazer. Deputy Anderson retrieved the two cans which were identified as Four Loko cans, with a measurable amount of alcohol still inside each. Deputy Anderson also observed a digital scale on the backseat with a white/ crystalline substance on the scale, consistent with meth-

amphetamine.

When asked about the digital scale and crystalline substance the above named defendant admitted to using methamphetamine earlier in the day. The above named defendant also admitted to possessing methamphetamine in his pocket. Deputy Anderson retrieved a straw and piece of plastic in the above named defendant's right pocket. A baggie of a white crystalline substance was wrapped in the plastic. The above named defendant stated he bought the methamphetamine earlier in the

day for a few hundred dollars. The above named defendant was placed under arrest and transported to the Hubbard County Jail. Deputy Anderson then drafted a search warrant for a sample of the above named defendant's blood or urine. The warrant was approved by the Honorable Judge Robert Tiffany and a blood sample was obtained from the above named defendant at approximately 11:45 p.m. The blood sample was sent to the Minnesota BCA

with results pending. Deputy Anderson field tested the digital scale and baggie of suspected methamphetamine, which both tested positive for methamphetamine, a schedule II controlled substance. The baggie was weighed with a result of 3.70 grams.

A check of the above named defendant's criminal history reveals the following convictions: 2nd degree controlled substance sale - October 17, 2011 - 29-CR-10-461; Gross Misdemeanor DWI – August 6, 2007 – 11-CR-07-1604; Misdemeanor DWI December 16, 2004 – 44-T0-04-901.


