to try to purchase a total of 177 acres that are surrounded by public land. The largest chunk of that is in Pine Lake Township (150 acres) and Crooked Lake Township (27 acres). According to Titus, the land is intended to be managed as county forest and to the Forest Stewardship Council's forest certification standard. It would be open to public hunting and fishing while also providing clean water, wildlife habitat and other recreational opportunities. A 10% match of the grant amount requested is required. It may be cash or in-kind, and in order to help secure the grant, staff is requesting approval to use up to \$20,000 (10%) from the Forest Development Fund as a cash match in the application. The funds have been budgeted and approved for land asset management types of activities. These funds are not levy dollars, but rather from timber and land sales. **Central Services** Director Tim Richardson

received authorization from the board to spend \$35,000 to replace worn equipment. He explained that the 29-year-old Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS) that keeps servers, switches, routers, and most of the network devices running constantly is deemed to be permanently down. "We had two incidents in the last month that caused it to fail," he said. "During a recent power outage, the system went down. It appeared to be a bad battery. Upon replacement of the batteries (because they are in series, they all have to be in good condition), we restarted the system and it appeared to be functioning as it should. Then it abruptly shut down on August 21, when still on regular power. As an emergency measure, we have put 10 small UPS units in the server rooms. They are capable of holding for a few minutes in the event of a power failure and long enough for the generator to kick in. Additionally, the cooling system for the primary server room has been unreliable over the last month. Honeywell has been able to

replace the failed components, but that is also 29 years old, and we are concerned that while the compressor, starter, and other common parts are still available, the inside pieces of the evaporator, expansion valve, fans, and coil, are not. I would like to use any funds not used for a replacement UPS to cover the replacement of the current server room cooling system, approximately \$7,000, for replacement of the SEER 19 system. A direct replacement minimizes the need for any additional electrical wiring and modification, as well as gets the UPS on-line quickly."

Chief Financial officer Sandra Norikane noted that this item has been written into the equipment budget for more frequent updates, since it doesn't make sense to wait 29 years for the system to fail before replacing it. **Highway Department** 

The new Pine River shop construction project, which was completed in 2016, included a design/build contract for the HVAC system. Highway Engineer Darrick Anderson explained that a county garage is somewhat unique in that it has lots of moisture from melting snow off the trucks and yet large garage doors letting in cold air. The current system is inadequate; it does not maintain heat in the building during the winter and is also very inefficient with the use of electric make-up air units. No specific direction or design was required in the previous contract, leaving the resolution to this issue outside the previous HVAC contractor's responsibility.

A proposal to correct the problem was designed by a mechanical engineer with Widseth Smith Nolting of Baxter, and calls for replacing the existing electric units with gas units and providing insulated dampers. Anderson noted that future projects will involve a mechanical engineer at the onset to save money.

County Administrator Josh Stevenson said that even with this extra action, they are still considerably under cost com-

similar project. Their cost for the garage is about \$900,000, while other counties are spending between \$2-2.5 million.

The board approved a quote from Hawkinson Construction for paving the area into and around the highway garage in Longville for \$105,198; Anderson Brothers quote was for \$108,900. Anderson explained that the

Highway Department is work-

ing with the City of Pine River on a joint project within and outside the city limits of Pine River to coordinate the construction work on CSAH 1 & CSAH 44. Bolton & Menk, Inc., is the appointed city engineer for the City of Pine River. "We requested and received a proposal from Bolton & Menk for full design and construction administration services on the proposed 2020 project," he said. "This project will include utility work for the City of Pine River, a surface improvement project on CSAH 1 and a roundabout at the intersection of CSAH 1 & CSAH 44. The construction project is being funded with State Aid, Local Road Improvement Project (LRIP) and Federal funds through the State Transportation Block Grant Program. This contract will be funded with local and State Aid funds. This contract is only for county improvements; the city will be responsible for their share of the design and construction as it relates to their utility improvements."

The board approved the contract with Bolton & Menk, Inc., for engineering services in and around the City of Pine River in the amount of \$390,586.

#### **Solid Waste**

The board approved moving of some equipment between departments during the meeting on Tuesday. According to Environmental Services Director John Ringle, the Solid Waste Program is asking to use the Highway Dept's 938 Caterpillar loader to load solid waste into hauling trailers at the Pine

..... continued from Front pared to other counties on a River Transfer Station under the new Transfer Station Management agreement with Waste Partners until its new material handler is purchased and delivered. To do so will require modification of the bucket and foam-filled tires to prevent blowouts. Once complete, those modifications to the loader will not fit Highway Department needs and so they would sell it after they

Ringle proposed that the proceeds from such a sale, after the new material handler is in use, be put in the Highway Department's equipment fund. The described loader is currently scheduled for replacement in 2021. This move will require a modification to the capital plan and possibly a budget amendment, pending the timing of the sale of the modified loader. Ringle expects they would be using it for about three months.

The board approved the requested move and the purchase of a new loader for the highway department. The total expenditure approved, including the new loader, was \$170,000.

The board also approved an agreement to hire attorney Paul Reuvers and his law firm (Iverson, Reuvers & Condon) to assist ESD in making recommendations to reorganize and consolidate sections of the county's Land Use Ordinance and Subdivision Ordinance. These ordinances were first drafted in 1996 and have undergone countless revisions over the past 20 plus years. The most recent Land Use Ordinance, first compiled in 2005, has undergone 11 amendments, and was last amended and renumbered Ordinance 2018-02. According to Ringle, this would get the ordinances back into a correct framework and simplify everything.
