Stay in your lane!

Peter had an age old disease, which we call "the foot-in-mouth disease," by sticking his foot in his mouth. Jesus told him, Peter the best thing that you can do is to "stay in your lane."

The next time you get a wild hair and go on a witch hunt against a fellow believer who is hanging on by a thread, the best thing you could ever do is to "stay in your lane." The next time you begin to get that itch to tell others how they should serve God and live for God, you need to retreat and "stay in your lane."

The church of today is filled with "claim jumpers" who are set on jumping into the business of others. Stay in your own lane and run your own race. Unless you're prepared to deal with the aftermath, never invite yourself to a situation where your presence is not requested or welcome. Don't pull out a chair at someone else's table, then turn around and be hurt when you feel unwelcome.

When we willfully choose to take our eyes off Jesus and focus on what other people are doing, we begin to compare, we judge and we foster feelings of insecurity and self-righteousness. We compare our callings to others. We compare our talents, gifts and even our service to others. Pretty soon, our eyes are off Jesus, and we fall short.

This is a game you can't win. If you're called to be at church every single time the doors are open because the Lord told you to, then do it! Don't worry about who is not there. Pray for them and reach out to them, but keep your eyes focused on the Lord. You don't know what He's doing behind the scenes.

There's a gentleman who plays the guitar at a local church, and I love how he handles his calling so humbly. Nobody wants me to take his spot playing guitar at that church – that's his calling, not mine. I stay in my lane by sitting back and enjoying his beautiful musical contribution to the service.

Don't be distracted by others; just stay in your lane. Be so focused on Jesus and on what He wants to do in your life that you literally do not have the time to play the comparison game.

I firmly believe that if each of us would practice more self-awareness and self-reflection when it comes to our interpersonal relationships,

we'd have less swerving out of our lanes and having emotional fender benders because we aren't paying attention or taking responsibility for our behavior.

Please allow me to give you some examples of what I am talking about:

1.) If I am not the one who works with the ushers in the first place, and I am always telling them what they need to do – I am out of my lane.

2.) If I am not the organist or pianist or the drummer, and I am always trying to tell them how to play, and I don't even play – I am definitely out of my lane.

3.) If I am not the choir director, and I am always trying to direct the choir – I have veered into the wrong lane.

4.) If I am not the one in charge of the pastor or church anniversary, and I take it upon myself to go and ask people to do something on those programs, and I have not asked the chairperson if that is okay – I have jumped out of my lane and crossed over into oncoming traffic.

Now, we must remember that it is not wrong to be a part of and to work with others, but when you decide on your own to take the authority of the one who has been placed in the lead position, you have become a hindrance. You are not respecting the one who has been chosen to lead. We must all remember our place and be there to support, not take over.

I am reminded of King Uzziah. 2 Chronicles 26:16 says, "But when he was strong his heart was lifted up, to his destruction, for he transgressed against the Lord his God by entering the temple of the Lord to burn incense on the altar of incense." God struck him with leprosy because only the priests were permitted to burn incense on the Altar of Incense. Uzziah crossed over into an area where he was not supposed to be.

God made you the way He wants you to be. He designed you and gifted you, anointed you and equipped you for a purpose. He Himself wants you to be the best version of who He made you to be!

We need to stay in our lane. It's not worth the drama to cross over.

Corps' Thurmond Lake Project accepts Christmas trees for recycling

SAVANNAH, Ga. – The U. S. Army Corps of Engineers' Thurmond Lake Project Office will accept natural Christmas trees (no artificial trees) for recycling through Jan. 9, 2019. Artificial trees will not be accepted.

The Christmas trees can be dropped off at Riverside Middle School, located in Evans, Ga. All decorations – tinsel, lights, garland, bulbs, etc. – must be removed from the trees before dropping them off. Dumping of wireframe wreaths, yard debris and household trash at the site is strictly prohibited.

The recycled trees will be used as fish attractors in Thurmond Lake. Corps rangers and volunteers will

place submerged trees around fishing piers to improve fishing habitat. Additional trees will be staged at select ramps around the lake to be used by the public. Anyone wishing to obtain a list of locations where the trees

will be available should contact the Corps' Thurmond Lake Office after Jan. 9.
