Seth Tindle of Atwood sentenced in Douglas County to 15 years for hijacking a vehicle with baby inside

Seth Tindle, 22, of Atwood pleaded guilty before Douglas County Judge Rick Broch on Wednesday, January 2, to a single count of vehicular hijacking, a Class One felony. Tindle was sentenced to 15 years in prison for stealing a car in Atwood with a baby inside.

Douglas County States Attorney Kate Watson said she feels the sentence is appropriate to the crime committed.

"It was very disturbing to the victim and mother," Watson said. "Luckily, due to prompt and efficient police work, no one was injured. Tindle has never been to prison before and that may have been a help with the verdict. The family is satisfied with the verdict.'

On Tuesday, September 25, 2018, the victim was preparing to leave her sister's home in the 300 block of Oak Drive. She was placing her six-month-old baby in her vehicle, when a male, later identified as Seth Tindle, ran out of the house next door and told the victim that someone was trying to kill him. He pushed her out of the way, entered the vehicle, and drove away with the baby in the back seat.

Atwood Police Chief Rob Bross of Atwood Police Department was advised of the situation and the vehicle information and attempted to locate Tindle. Officers from Arthur Police Dement, and Douglas County Sherwith the incident.
