My sister sent me a very interesting birthday card in October. It was a card/booklet titled "Back in the Day 1951, Reflections of a Special Year," and contained facts about the year such as the price of cars, salaries of certain professions, and color reprints of magazine ads.

According to this booklet, the year I was born the "Dennis the Menace" comic strip appeared for the first time in newspapers. Rodgers and Hammerstein's "The King and I" opened on Broadway.

Also, J.D. Salinger published Catcher in the Rye and "I Love Lucy" made its television debut. Band-Aid introduced plastic strips; Swanson introduced beef, chicken, and turkey pot pies. The CBS "eye" logo premiered on television, and Clorets chewing gum and mints were introduced.

Overall average income per person was \$3,709 per year. The President of the United States was at the top of the salary totem pole at \$100,000; Vice President \$30,000; U.S. Senator \$12,500; construction \$4,001; coal miner \$3,853; manufacturing \$3,294; clerical \$2,842; State and Local Government Employees \$2,800; and teachers \$2,683. Minimum wage was 75 cents per hour.

And, yes, the federal government was in debt back then, too-to the tune of \$255,288,000,000 (over \$255 billion)!

If you were born in 1951 as I was, you were one of 3,823,000 babies born that year. U.S. population was 154,877,889. Life expectancy was 68.4 years. Unemployment was 3.2 percent.

Average price of a new home was \$9,000. A new car set you back \$1,500, and gasoline to power your new ride cost 27 cents per gallon.

Other prices paid in 1951: eggs, 74 cents per dozen; butter 82 cents per pound: bread, 16 cents per loaf: coffee, 86 cents per pound; potatoes, 51 cents per 10 pounds; milk, 92 cents per gallon; bacon 67 cents per pound, and sugar, 51 cents per five pounds.

A movie ticket to see "An American in Paris," winner of the Academy Award for Best Picture, cost 53 cents. A postage stamp to send a letter to your girl friend was three cents. The Post Office handled 46,908,410,000 pieces of mail that year.

Home appliances featured in magazine ads in 1951 include Roper, "America's Finest Gas Range"; Westinghouse clothes dryer; Crosley self-defrosting refrigerator, "Only Crosley Gives You the Shelvador"; and Sunbeam Mixmaster.

If you like to play golf, you should appreciate the fact that the R&A and USGA in 1951 agreed to a common set of rules, standardizing the way golf is played around the world.

Some sports notes from 1951:

First NBA All-Star Game was played at the Boston Gardens.

Bobby Thompson of the New York Giants hit the "Shot Heard 'Round the World," a three-run, walk-off home run to give the Giants a 5-4 win over the Brooklyn Dodgers for the National League title. The Giants, however, lost the World Series to the New York Yankees.

The National Football League played its first Pro Bowl Game, and Joe DiMaggio played in his final career regular season game.

Champions in 1951 (in addition to the Yankees): Los Angeles Rams, pro football; Lee Wallard, Indianapolis 500; Toronto Maple Leafs, Stanley Cup; Kentucky, NCAA basketball; Tennessee, college football; Dick Kazmaier, Heisman Trophy; Count Turf, Kentucky Derby; Dick Savitt, Wimbledon; and Herb Thomas, NASCAR.

Looking for electronics in 1951? You probably checked out Magnavox TVs, Schick electric razors, GE clock radios, and IBM electric typewriters. Sorry, no word processors in 1951; although the UNIVAC I, the first commercial computer, was produced that year in the U.S.

Some news headlines from the year I was born:

The Great Flood of 1951 reached its highest point in Northeast Kansas, culminating in the greatest flood damage to date in the Midwestern United States.

In San Francisco, California, 48 nations signed a peace treaty with Japan to formally end the Pacific War.

The Twenty-Second Amendment to the United State Constitution, limiting Presidents to two terms, was ratified.

Nuclear testing at the Nevada Test Site began with a one-kiloton bomb dropped on Frenchman Flat, northwest of Las Vegas, Nevada.

Chinese and North Korean forces captured Seoul for the second time.

Famous people sharing 1951 as their birth year include Rush Limbaugh, radio; Kurt Russell, Kirstie Alley, Tony Danza, Richard Thomas, Lynda Carter, Lou Ferrigno, and Michael Keaton, actors; and Phil Collins and John Mellencamp, musicians.

I leave you with one of my favorites: In 1951, Dairy Queen added banana splits to its menu. Looks like I came along just in time!
