The Arthur Lovington Atwood Hammond boys basketball team was hoping to add to their win total this past week of play, but the Knights came up short in

The first game of the week was a rare Monday night contest at Paris High School. The Knights played the Tigers tough but eventually fell by a final score of 56-39.

Arthur Lovington Atwood Hammond was led by Austin Plank with 16 points including four three-pointers. He was assisted in the scoring column by Austin Romine, 8 points; Domonick Baker 7; Adam Day 6; and Adam Hingson 2.

Arthur Lovington Atwood Hammond was on the road again the very next night in Moweaqua to face off against Central A&M. The Raiders came into the contest with a 14-3 record, so the Knights knew this would be a tough opponent.

The Arthur Lovington Atwood Hammond Knights girls' basketball team easily won two more conference games last week to move to 3-0 in the Little Okaw Valley Conference Northwest just ahead of the league's tournament.

Arthur Lovington Atwood Hammond left no doubt about either game, defeating Decatur Lutheran by 38 points and Blue Ridge (Farmer City) by 37 points.

The two victories gave the Knights seven wins in their last eight games. The only loss was to state-ranked Sullivan, and that was only by eight points.

The Knights scored early and often in their home game against LSA, taking a 20-3 lead at the end of the first quarter. The Knights expanded that lead to 47-13 by halftime.

The second half was all Knights as well with the Lions unable to find a rhythm on offense and having trouble stopping ALAH on defense. The result was a 60-22 LOVC NW win for Arthur Lovington Atwood Hammond.

The Knights had three players in double figures in the game. Marissa Herschberger led with 17 points. Makenzi Bowles added 15 points and Jolynn Barbee 10. Addi Tinkle and Alexa Miller each had eight points, and Mallory Nichols chipped in with a twopoint bucket.


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
