Vault Bluegrass Jam, singer-songwriter event

The roof at the Vault Art Gallery in downtown Tuscola will be raised — by music — Saturday.

The Vault will have its regular "Bluegrass Jam" at the Vault from 2-4 p.m. in the main downstairs foyer followed by a special "Singer-Songwriter Showcase" from 5-8 p.m. upstairs. The bluegrass jam, as always, is free and open to the public and area musicians with an acoustic instrument are welcome to join in.

"It's amazing how much the 'Bluegrass Jam' has grown since it was started by Marty Gibson early last year," Vault manager Kirby Pringle said. "At the last session we had 16 musicians show up and they ranged in

age from 16 to 85, so it was special to watch. The crowd has also grown to the point that I am having trouble figuring out where to have the event."

When Gibson, who runs Rock University and offers music lessons upstairs at the Vault, started the bluegrass jam, he had no idea what to expect.

"It's been a lot of fun to see how many people — musicians and the audience — really seem to enjoy the event. It's grown by leaps and bounds," Gibson added.

The bluegrass jam will be held in the main room at the entrance of the Vault.

"I hope I can find enough chairs," Pringle joked.


Meanwhile, the special

singer-songwriter showcase kicks off at 5 p.m. and will last until 8 p.m. Performing musicians include Denny Ellis of Tuscola, Ashley Shields of DeLand, JAM (featuring Julia Welle on lead vocals and percussion along with Matthew Wilkie on acoustic guitar and backing vocals) and Jason Waldrop of Decatur. There will be a small \$5 cover charge for the showcase and each singer will perform an approximately 45-minute set of covers and originals.


"We haven't done an event like this in the past so I'm hoping it all works out and the weather cooperates. Each of the singer-songwriters offers a unique style — Waldrop, for example, per-

forms on a homemade cigar box guitar while Shields has a voice that packs a wallop," Pringle said. "And Ellis, who has put the whole thing together, is also a regular at the bluegrass jam and also is involved with several local rock bands. I haven't heard JAM perform yet, but I've always loved the sounds of female-male duets and I'm looking forward to seeing what they have to offer."
