For those who don't follow the numbers, WAR basically means that the D'backs were likely to win 6 more games with Goldy on the field than with any other player at his position. Winning games is important, right?

What it all boils down to is the fact that the players are generally underpaid for their first few years in the big leagues, compared to the mountains of cash that they generate for their teams. As long as they received the big money deals later in their careers, they were willing to take less up front. Of course less is a rather relative term, since for 2019, the minimum salary a big leaguer can earn is \$555,000.

There's no way around it. A half million dollars is a lot of cash, and that's for anyone who walks onto the field as part of a MLB team. The average salary for 2018 was \$4.52 million.

How could they possibly complain about that, right? Wrong. In 2017, MLB generated \$10 billion dollars in revenue, which set a record for the fifteenth straight year, according to MLB.com.

All of this cash came in despite MLB attendance dropping by 4 percent in 2018, compared to the previous season. As anyone can attest, going to a big league ball game can be an expensive proposition. A couple dogs, a couple of beers and you've racked up a couple of hundred dollars in spending for the day.

So there you have it. Millionaires doing battle with billionaires, and the sentimental old schmucks like myself come out the losers. I'm the guy who still tries to keep a scorebook when he goes to games. I'm the guy who can wax poetic at the sharp contrast between the deep green of the outfield grass and the crisp white paint of the foul lines. I'm the guy who marvels at the amazing symmetry of the infield dirt, and whose eyes well up at the sound of the stadium vendors hawking their wares, thinking back to the days of my youth when I would spend a day at the ball park with my dad or my Uncle Bill, the encyclopedia of baseball facts and figures.

I hope that the powers that be come up with an amiable solution before they damage the game that I love. Because I'm sure I'm not the only sentimental softy who fondly remembers a day at the ball park. Interactive viewing experiences and games played in other countries and advanced analytics and everything are all great, but they can't compare to the sound of a wood bat making solid contact. They can't compare to those rare moments when a foul ball is heading toward your seat. They can't compare to 40,000 people singing "Take me out to the Ballgame" in unison. They just can't, can they?
