Mullin will field a young football team for the second straight season, but for the first time since 2015-2016, the Bulldogs will have the same head coach for two consecutive years.

"I believe that will make a big difference," said Brent Williamson, who is returning after coaching the Class 1A (six-man) Bulldogs through a 1-9 season in 2019 with a roster filled with freshmen and sophomores. "Consistency in coaching will help any program. With that continuity, the kids start to believe in the coaches and themselves. We're looking for better times this year."

The Bulldogs have no seniors on this year's preseason roster, but they do have four juniors in running back Trent Coston and linemen Travis



Lytle, Brian Moore and Cody erable improvement on of- kee has a senior-heavy team," Holland. Sophomores Cyrus Jackson, Esteban Hernandez, Abel Martinez and Hayden Thomas also return after seeing considerable playing time last year as freshmen.

"It would be nice to have some seniors," Williamson said. "We had to play a varsity schedule last year with mostly freshmen and sophomores. We're still young and fairly small, and those things will hurt us.

"But with a year's experience, we're better, athletically, and better overall than last year. We just need time to build -- and keep the kids' confidence up and keep them working hard. Our kids need to realize that they have an opportunity to take one step at a time and get better."

Coston is a returning starter at running back, but the Bulldogs need another back to emerge. It could be Jackson, who played more at quarterback last year. Martinez and Thomas are the projected starters at receiver. The Bulldogs have all their linemen back from last year in the 180-pound Lytle and the 200-pound Hernandez. Moore returns as center when Mullin's offense utilizes the spread formation.

Troy Shelton, a 6-foot-1, 165-pound freshman, is expected to take over at quarterback and spreadback.

The Bulldogs' defense allowed 52 points per game last season.

Mullin finished 0-4 in district last year. They moved to the reshuffled District 16-1A has a high school enrollment Division II that includes defending state champion Richland Springs. The Coyotes are a heavy favorite to win district this year, with Rochelle picked second, Cherokee third, Mullin fourth and Lohn fifth. Richland Springs opens the season ranked No. 4 statewide by texasfootball. com. Rochelle returns 20 of 23 players from last year's 8-3 team, and Cherokee returns all its starters from a team that finished 2-2 in district.

"We're in a tough district with the defending state champs. Rochelle returns almost everybody, and Chero-

Williamson said. "But we hope to find a way to get one of the (two) playoff spots."

Although Mullin will enter this season trying to end Lytle, Moore, Hernandez an eight-game losing skid, the Bulldogs won five games as recently as 2017 and they won six games in 2016. The first playoff berth since 2014 and first district title since 2004.
