boxes and hoods along with a few other things to help them get a start in their career. Most of them enter the workforce upon graduation. Through the five years, 63 students have received Tools for Success.

"This is our biggest class yet," Bobbie Hicks said. "I'm so happy about that." Under normal circumstances, the foundation would have held its annual fundraising memorial ATV ride in April and used those proceeds to purchase the students several of the needed items to get going on the jobsite, including gang boxes. When the coronavirus pandemic shut down everything, the couple had to think on their feet because

they weren't going to let the pandemic keep them from giving the students the recognition they deserved.

"I was scared we wouldn't be able to do it," Hicks said. "We knew we had to figure out how. We weren't backing out."
