Minco will be having it's 30th annual Honey Fest on Saturday, December 5th. There will be free food samples, milk, chocolate milk, and cheese provided by Braum's Dairy and Minco Chamber of Commerce located at City Hall, downtown Minco.

2020 does bring along some changes, though. The goal is to bring you all the family fun Visit Santa downtown from 10 of the honey festival in a safe

environment. While some aspects of the festival will look different this year, as there will be no tours, some location changes, and some other difficulties that Deanna Walje with the Minco Chamber of Commerce discussed.

"Our biggest change would be that we will not be using the school building due to COVID-19 and the policies they have to follow for that," she said. "So, we have moved our crafts and food vendors to the downtown area. We do have some indoor spaces for our craft people, but the majority of vendors will be outside. We are going to be placing them along the three block radius downtown. From the post office all the way to the east end of our Main Street area. We have different areas that our vendors will be set up in so they will somewhat by protected from the weather. They'll be all up and down Main Street. The crafters are pretty excited about it. They're willing to take the chance with the weather, and we're just going to go with it and make this the very best we can."

To prevent the spread of COVID-19, there will be no tours.

"We will not be able to have our tours this year because we want to prevent a congestion of people, although everything else will be going on just as normal."

There was a concern that the Honey Festival would be canceled or postponed.

"All summer long, we wanted to be able go ahead and have it. At that time, we were still okay to use the school, but they do have different policies than us. It just came down to the fact that we weren't goi to be able to use that. Then we came up with an alternative because we wanted to have the festival. After talking to all of our vendors, we found out that they wanted to have the festival. If this is the way we need to do it, hopefully just for this year, this is what we'll do."

It is hoped that you'll still be able to visit and have a socially distanced good time. Thank you for supporting the local businesses and the city of Minco as you celebrate the 30th annual Minco Honey Festival.
