## Officers support those in need

## Police continue to spread holiday cheer through difficult times

Despite snow and Covid-19, Christmas arrived early for some local children this year. It was part of the Shop with a Cop event provided by the Midwest City Police Department and Walmart.

Each child was paired with a police officer or department employee and given \$100 for a Walmart shopping spree.

The group included about 60 children and 35 police department employees. The event provides the opportunity for kids to see police officers in a positive light, and for officers to see the impact it has on children.

Cpt. Roger Ross explained how every officer is called to serve their community and how everyone looks forward to putting on this event everyone.

"It's always good to show generosity to oth-

ers. Every officer got into this job to serve, so it's fun to get to know the kids and show them that police officers aren't bad guys," Ross said. "We are just normal people. We all love doing this for these kids."

Many officers brought their families along with them to the event. One family that holds a special place in the department's heart is the Harding family.

Three years ago, the grandmother adopted her daughter's six children after the children's mother passed away from cancer. Since then, the department has made sure the family participates every year and lends a helping hand whenever needed.

The program is largely funded by Walmart's local charity program.

The Midwest City Police Department also collects donations for the program throughout the

year

Since it started, the program has assisted about 1,110 children in Midwest City. Local schools, neighborhood associations, and other social service agencies help select children to participate in the event. The children usually receive breakfast provided by Walmart but due to Covid-19, they were not able to do that this year.

Maj. Bob Cornelison talked about how great it is to get to know the kids and give back during the

holiday season.

"What's great about doing this is it allows officers to connect with kids and allows the kids to see officers as normal people. While at the same time bringing joy to the kids during the Christmas sea-

son," Cornelison said.

This was the 24th year for the Midwest City Shop with a Cop program, which started in 1997. Chief Brandon Clabes,
