Blount suffers tough loss to Toros

SPANISH FORT — Sometimes, good fortune can quickly turn bad.

Spanish Fort's 24-14 Class 6A quarterfinal win over Blount was the product of one disastrous Leopards play that proved to be a saving grace for the Toros season.

'We're practicing on Thanksgiving? That's special." Spanish Fort coach Ben Blackmon said quizzically about his 7th-ranked Toros (10-3) now preparing to host 5th-ranked Saraland (11-2) in the semifinals Friday for the right to play for the state championship Dec. 4th at Bryant-Denny Stadium in Tuscaloosa.

Saraland, which beat Opelika 46-27 in its quarterfinal game, lost at

home to Spanish Fort 24-21 on Oct. referees in tow. 2. Blount ends its season 8-5.

Behind a defense that refused to wilt under relentless pressure from the Leopards' offensive arsenal, and the alertness of linebacker Logan Ganey, the Toros will indeed practice on Turkey Day.

With Blount trailing 17-14 midway the fourth quarter, but knocking on the door at Spanish Fort's 15, wide receiver Kameron Grays flattened out his route on a swing pass from quarterback Melvin Williams Jr., but dropped what would've been a sure walk-in TD.

As Grays flailed his arms in frustration over the drop, Ganey swooped in to pick it up what was ruled a lateral and took off the other way with at least three

He was finally run down by Williams just short of the goal line to set up quarterback Brendon Byrd's 1-yard plunge two plays later that completed a huge 14-point swing.

"He should've got in front of it, it's something we go over, but it didn't happen so ... we had our chances," said Blount coach Lev Holly of the costly play.

"But I'm so proud of this team for what they fought through all year long, and to still get here. I love these guys."

Byrd said it was an uphill battle, but his team just kept fighting.

"Their defense is really good, but our offense just had to hold up and block right," said the Toros

sophomore quarterback before disappearing into a jubilant Spanish Fort locker room.

"We're just glad to get a win."

Blount defensive tackle and Auburn commit Lee Hunter had 13 solo tackles and was sought out afterwards by both Spanish Fort players and coaches for congratulations on his dominant final high school performance.

"We wanted to run the ball away from Number 7," said Byrd on the Toros' game plan to run plays away from wherever Hunter lined up.

Jacob Godfrey ran in from 4-yards out, Byrd found wide receiver Micah Gaffney all alone on a blown Leopards coverage for a 64-yard TD pass and Lucas Breuax connected on a 35-yard field goal for the Toros' other score.

Blount's Jarris Williams, committed to Troy University, ran in from 3 and 66 yards out for both Leopards' scores.

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Byrd was only 4-of-7 and was intercepted twice for a meager 82 vards, most coming on his 64-varder to Gaffney, but he picked up a timely 47 yards rushing to keep critical possessions alive.

Despite COVID-19 recommendations on social distancing, the game was played in front of a standingroom-only crowd, with those not having a seat gathering around the fence that rings the field.

Those tuned away at the gate parked on a hill overlooking the stadium and watched from their cars.

The players were not the only ones to be excited for the Lady Gators to be moving on. Satsuma head softball coach B.J. Darawich said the day was a memorable one for him as well as his team.

"These kids have known me for a long time; three of them have been with me since seventh grade," he said. "Two of them had transferred in and one of the transfers I coached when she was a kid. during the time I was at the University of Mobile and she attended camps there.

"They're not just special softball players, they're great kids, including academically and the way they handle themselves in the community. For Darawich, the multiple signings were an emotional time.

"They all have been together for a long time," he said. "This is a very close group. It's hard for them to see them go. but I'm also excited because their work ethic is going to go where they go."

Faith's Emma Harrell will play for Southeastern **Baptist's first softball team**

MOBILE - Faith Academy's Emma Harrell signed a softball scholarship with Southeastern Baptist College of Laurel, Miss., during ceremonies held in Faith Academy's cafeteria on Nov. 18.

Harrell, an outfielder and second baseman for the Rams, has been with the Faith softball program for three years. During her junior year, she was named to the Mobile County Coaches Association's All-County team. Her career average is .310, two triples, two home runs, and 11 RBIs. Because of the statewide shutdown for all spring sports, Harrell's stats were reduced as Faith managed to play only nine games.

Southeastern Baptist is starting a women's softball team for the first time in history, and Chargers' head coach Stephen Ulmer said that Harwell's signing was very special.

"It's a very special day for us," he said. "Emma's the type of player that will help our team. But it's not just about softball, it's about serving the Lord."

For Harrell, signing with Southeastern Baptist was special for another reason. She thought about her late grandfather, Glenn Harrell, and how he encouraged her to do her very best.
