Early voting dates, mail-in ballot rules

There will be lots of chances to vote in this year's General Election.

County Clerk Jana Kennon said her office was petitioned by the local Democratic Party to have extended Early Voting hours. Enough signatures were obtained that new hours have been added.

In addition Governor Greg Abbott has extended Early Voting to run for three weeks, instead of the normal two week-period. While there will be three weeks of Early Voting, each week will have different hours, and one includes weekend hours.

Early Voting for the November 3 General Election began Tuesday, October 13. The Early Voting location is the Forum Room at the Auditorium.

For voting Tuesday thru Friday, Oct. 13-16 the early voting hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

On Saturday, Oct. 17, Early Voting is available from 7 a.m. till 7 p.m. On Sun-

day, Oct. 18, Early Voting is available from 12 noon until 5 p.m.

On Monday through Friday, Oct. 19-23, Early Voting is from 8 a.m. until 5

On Monday through Friday, Oct. 26-30, Early Voting is from 7 a.m. until 7

MAIL-IN BALLOTS

The last day that a person can apply for a ballot by mail is Oct. 23, 2020.

Kennon said that for the November General Election, a person can walk their ballot into the Wilbarger County Clerk's Office Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. until 5 p.m. instead of mailing it in, if they choose.

They must present an ID and sign a signature roster. The voter can only deliver their own ballot.

If they will call 940-552-5486, the County Clerk employees will do a curbside pickup on the east side of the courthouse.

Cornyn, Hegar hold senate debate

U.S. Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas, and his Democratic opponent, MJ Hegar, butted heads Friday evening in a debate over a host of timely issues — the coronavirus pandemic, race and policing, and the U.S. Supreme Court.

As the two appeared together in Austin, Cornyn repeatedly bashed Hegar as a puppet of Democratic leaders in Washington, D.C., suggesting her views are too liberal for Texas. She in turn challenged him to train his attacks on her and argued he has lost touch with the state after 18 years in the Senate.

On the pandemic, Cornyn touted the early coronavirus relief package that he supported in Congress and lamented gridlock over more recent proposals, while Hegar suggested it is "time for him to step aside" and let people like her negotiate aid.

Both candidates were asked if they would support another "national lockdown" if there is another coronavirus surge. Cornyn said he does not, Heger said yes.

Cornyn said he does not "believe that we need any lockdowns" going forward, citing damage to the economy and emphasizing personal responsibility. Hegar responded by suggesting Cornyn was giving short shrift to science and saying, "Yes, I think we need to partner with public health experts."

Asked if they support a national mask mandate, Cornyn said he did not, saying the United States — as well as Texas — is a "big, diverse place."

"We don't need the government to fill the void that we should fill ourselves by acting responsibly at the local level to keep each other safe and to get this economy growing again," Cornyn said.

Hegar did not give as precise of an answer but agreed that "different parts of Texas are different" and called for a "national strategy that takes science and objective metrics into consideration."

On law enforcement
— the two clashed most
bitterly when Cornyn
suggested Hegar wants
to "defund the police."
Hegar denied that.

Hegar backed renaming
Fort Hood, while Cornyn
did not. Asked about marijuana decriminalization,
Cornyn said he wanted to
see more research about
the drug's impact on young
people's brains, while
Hegar flatly said she supported decriminalization.

There was also ample sparring over the energy

industry, pivotal to oilrich Texas.

After Hegar talked about securing energy jobs for the future, Cornyn shot back: "If MJ's worried about jobs, then she would not be an advocating a carbon tax that would destroy the jobs of hundreds of thousands of workers out in West Texas and around the nation."

Hegar disputed that she has pushed for a carbon tax but was cut off by a moderator while seeking to elaborate. During a July candidate forum, Hegar was asked about a carbon tax and said, "I stand with the League of Conservation Voters and the Sierra Club who support it but understand that it's not a silver bullet, that we actually do need to be taking a more holistic approach."

Perhaps most notably on energy, Hegar said she does not support a ban on fracking, a question she did not respond to as decisively while she was running for her party's nomination. "I do support investment in clean, renewable energy that gets us to a place where we don't need fracking," she added.

In another throwback to the Democratic nominating process, the moderators showed Hegar a Wednesday quote from her runoff opponent, state Sen. Royce West, saying she has "not called me to ask for my support." Hegar replied that it was not her style to pursue such endorsements.

"A lot of people express frustration that I don't engage in politics as usual," Hegar said. "Personal endorsements tend to come with quid proquo that I believe are a big part of what's broken in politics."

CORNYN LEADS IN POLL

U.S. Sen. John Cornyn leads Democratic challenger MJ Hegar by 8 percentage points in his reelection bid, according to the latest University of Texas/Texas Tribune Poll.

The poll found 50% of likely voters in Texas prefer the Republican incumbent, while 42% favor Hegar.

In the state's presidential race, where President Donald Trump is leading former Vice President Joe Biden 50%-45%,

Senate wants another Covid aid vote in October

Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell said Tuesday that he's scheduling a procedural vote on a GOP COVID-19 relief bill next week, saying aid to hard-hit businesses shouldn't be held up by gridlock involving other aid proposals.

The Kentucky Republican says the first item of Senate business when the chamber returns next Monday will be a procedural vote on a scaled-back aid bill. Democrats filibustered a GOP-drafted aid bill last month and recent talks on a larger deal fell apart this past weekend.

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
