The Revolutionary War (1775-1783), also known as the War of American Independence, was initiated by the thirteen original colonies against Britain due to taxation and misrepresentation.

From the original founding of the colonies, they were left to govern themselves until France left North America in 1763, at which time Britain expanded and looked for new ways for expenses to be paid. The 1765 Stamp Act 1767-1768 the Townshend Acts provoked colonial opposition and unrest, leading to the 1770 Boston Massacre and 1773 Boston Tea Party.

The colonies responded with the First Continental Congress to boycott British goods. Fighting broke out on 19 April 1775 when the British garrison at Boston

The war raged on summer and winter with soldiers dying in battle and in camp. Conditions in camp was desolate, dysentery and lack of nutrition was common in most Colonial camps.

Some soldiers were father and son, with their wife following to provide food for soldiers and caring for the wounded. Winter found soldiers camped in snow with no shoes. Conditions were deplorable. But the mission was to be free of England so no utter of complaint was made.

They knew what they had to do and they did it. Until the last battle at Yorktown occurred showing the British that American wanted their independence, they didn't give up. Talks began and the initial treaty was signed in November 1782 with Treaty of

Paris signed between Great Britain and United States on September 3, 1783.

We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America. This is the Preamble of the United States Constitution


tial purposes: and may enable every instrument employed in its administration to execute with success, the functions allotted to his charge."
