Fountain Run FD gets new truck

Thanks in part to a grant, The Fountain Run Fire Department will be welcoming a new 2005 Freight-liner with a 2000 gallon water capacity in 2020.

The truck will cost the \$138,081 dollars. A good portion of that will he paid by the grant, \$18,000 will be paid by the Monroe Fiscal Court and volunteers are working to raise the remainder of the money necessary for the purchase.

KSP Collects

236 Tons of Food

KSP initiated the Cram the Cruiser program in 2010 to assist needy families in its local post and region areas. Since then, the agency has contributed nearly two million pounds of food to shelters, food banks and churches throughout the Commonwealth.

"Helping those in need is the core of what being a member of the KSP family really is – service to others," Lawson added.

The Death of Leah Carter



2019 began tragically in Monroe County, with the discovery of the body of Leah Carter on January 5, 2019 around 10:30 in the morning.

Nearly a week long search for young and beautiful 19-year-old Carter ensued on New Year's Eve when her car was swept away in flood waters.

Civilian volunteers searching the area of East Fork Creek and Barren River and located the body of Leah Carter, 5 miles from Lyons Bridge where her car was carried away by flash flood waters.

"Leah was just the absolute sweetest child in school, sweetest person you could ever be around," said volunteer Lori Brown.

The search began New Year's Eve on the bridge where Leah called 911.

Her obituary follows: Gamaliel - Leah Elizabeth Carter, 19, of Gamaliel passed away December 31, 2018 due to an accident. She was born January 22, 1999 in Bowling Green, KY to Laura Wallace McCarty and the late Kelly Carter. She is survived by her mother and step-father: Laura and Gary McCarty of Gamaliel. Funeral services will be
