

Petett said in an interview during his last season as head coach that he always looked forward to the interaction with the kids during his camps. He hopes this will help increase their numbers in the future.

"I'm excited to get back to the grind of everything," said Petett. "We want our players to have that desire to play football again. That's what's first and foremost. We are going to make football players out of them."

The Falcons lost in the first round of the KH-SAA playoffs in 2019 They finished the season with a 5-6 record in Murphy's last season as head coach.
