EPA Administrator Wheeler Unveiled Navigable Waters Protection Rule

WASHINGTON (January 23, 2020) – Agriculture Commissioner Dr. Ryan Quarles praised the unveiling of the Navigable Waters Protection Rule (NWPR) by the Trump Administration's Environmental Protection Agency (EPA). The rule replaces the Obamaera Waters Of The United States (WOTUS) rule.

Administrator Andrew Wheeler," Commissioner Quarles said. "The new Navigable Waters Protection Rule reduces government overreach, upholds the rule of law, and eliminates burdens on farm families. Under President Trump's administration, we truly have a group of leaders who are listening to the needs of agricul-

"Kentucky Proud grant programs help promote the Commonwealth's local foods and agricultural products," Commissioner Quarles said. "As a result, these grants also help Kentucky family farms and agricultural businesses succeed. The aim of these grants is to help build economic ties that will last long after the grant is awarded."

The Buy Local program provides incentives for participating restaurants and other food service businesses to buy and
