McConnell and other state and local partners at Pisgah Bay on Kentucky Lake to observe the Modified Unified Method of removing carp from our waterways. Senator McConnell and I took a boat out with members from Kentucky Fish and Wildlife to observe this carp removal method firsthand. We held a press conference after our boating excursion and I had the opportunity to hear from local residents and community leaders on the best ways to continue combating Asian carp. I discussed my successful efforts advocating for federal resources to take on the issue and our continued attention to eradicating this invasive species.

### **Spending Time in Logan County**

I recently spent a very productive day visiting with constituents in Logan County. I had the opportunity to stop by Walnut Grove Farm - a 6th generation family grain farming operation - for a tour. We discussed agriculture issues of importance to their business and how family farms like Walnut Grove are setting an example for future family farms in Kentucky. I also visited the Logan County Jail to discuss rehabilitation programs. Rehabilitation is a key issue of importance to me as we continue to improve our workforce and ensure Kentuckians are able to access the education and workforce training programs necessary to Kentucky's economic future.

Discussing Welfare Reform in Oversight Committee

In an Oversight and Reform Committee hearing examining policies related to the workforce, SNAP benefits, and solutions to lift people out of poverty, I questioned witnesses about how the welfare system is serving Americans. We discussed how we can focus on positive changes to bring people out of poverty and into the workforce so Americans can better provide for themselves and their families. 
