She is looking forward most to meeting new people from different backgrounds, the steady paycheck, security and the overall experience she'll have in the military.

She'll attend Minnesota State University Moorhead for her biology degree and then Northwestern Health and Science University for her chiropractic degree.


"But now knowing a little more about it, I just really like the National Guard because of the people, it teaches you how to work hard and it's just a great opportunity," she said.
