Visit Kentucky Fish & Wildlife at upcoming outdoor shows

Meet staff from the Kentucky Department of Fish and Wildlife Resources and become more involved with wildlife conservation at several boat and outdoor shows ongoing through March.

With proof of hunters or boaters education registration, outdoor enthusiasts can receive free admission to shows in Louisville, Paducah and Lexington in Kentucky, Nashville, Tennessee, Indianapolis and Cincinnati. Kentucky Fish and Wildlife hopes to attract hunters and boaters by providing free educational resources. Fishing, hunting and boating are vital to Kentucky's outdoor industry; together with wildlife watching, as they contribute more than \$5.9 billion to the state's economy.

To complete hunter education certification, a range day is the final requirement. Shows

offering range days include: the Field and Stream EXPO in Paducah; the Kentucky Sport, Boat and Recreation Show in Lexington; and the National Archery in Schools Program (NASP) State Tournament in Louisville. Participants must register for a range day, which will involve the use of pellet rifles in a mobile, contained range to fulfill the requirement.

For boaters ages 12-17 needing certification, the Cincinnati Travel, Sport and Boat Show and Louisville Boat Show will feature free boater education certification.

"The boating shows will offer boater education certification at no cost, with help from Kentucky Fish and Wildlife employees, and it lasts a lifetime," said Marcus Bowling, boater education coordinator for Kentucky Fish and Wildlife.

Generally, boater education courses cost \$20 to \$30.

"Also, by showing proof of registration for boater education, each young boater and one guest will have free admission to the entire show," Bowling said

When boating unaccompanied in Kentucky, minors older than 12 years old are required to have boating safety education to operate motorized vessels that reach over 10 horsepower. This regulation helps to ensure safety on the water for the one million-plus boaters in the Commonwealth each year.

Additionally, each outdoor show will offer attendees the opportunity to purchase Kentucky hunting and fishing licenses and permits, apply for the coveted Elk Hunt Drawing, join Kentucky Wild and talk one-on-one with Kentucky Fish and Wildlife staff.

Green County Circuit Court

January 8 session Judge Todd Spalding presiding William Thomas Despain, 27, was sentenced to five years probated on two counts each of third-degree burglary, and theft by unlawful taking under \$10,000. He was ordered to serve an additional 36 days of alternative sentence and to pay \$194.25 restitution.

Elijah C. Rattliff, 20, was awarded pre-trial diversion for each of two counts of first-degree wanton endangerment of a police officer and one count each of first-degree want endangerment and first-degree fleeing or evading police. He was also sentenced to 12 months for falsely reporting an incident and 30 days each for DUI and possession of Marijuana, all probated. He was also sentenced to an alternative 30 day sentence in jail. His license was suspended for 30 days, and he was fined \$200 plus \$210 court costs.

Harry Ambrose Brown III, 50, pleaded guilty to two counts of receiving stolen property under \$10,000, theft by unlawful taking under \$10,000, cold checks, theft by failure to make required distribution of property, theft of a motor vehicle registration plate or decal, fleeing or evading police second-degree, convicted felon in possession of a firearm, and criminal mischief third-degree. The Commonwealth's Attorney's office recommends a sentence of

three years to serve on the first seven counts, and seven months on the fleeing or evading count, all to run concurrent. Plus restitution of \$105.80. Sentencing is set for Feb. 5.

Brown also pleaded guilty to second-degree burglary, first-degree criminal trespass, second-degree fleeing or evading police, resisting arrest, third-degree criminal mischief and third-degree criminal trespass. He was sentenced to seven months on each count, to run concurrently, and ordered to pay \$52.50 restitution

Demands placed on state government by our priorities, and other costs continue to outpace revenue growth. In the coming weeks, legislative branch staff and other resources will be utilized to help the General Assembly better determine a path forward for this year's budgetary balancing act. Per the Kentucky Constitution, budget bills must start in the House. I will keep you informed as the Senate begins to deliberate budgetary matters in the coming weeks.

While the new administration formulates its agenda and presents it to the legislature, the majority leadership in the General Assembly is continuing to move forward with a legislative agenda supported by Kentucky voters. Committee meetings are now in full swing, as this past week legislators began discussing bills recently assigned to their respective committees.

Senate Bill 56 (SB 56) passed unanimously out of the Health & Welfare Committee on Wednesday during its first meeting of the 2020 Session. The committee heard student testimony as well as a presentation from the Foundation for a Healthy Kentucky. SB 56 ensures Kentucky complies with the federal minimum legal age for the sale, purchase and use of tobacco products. It also eliminates possession penalties for youth up to age 21.

The State Senate passed Senate Bill 3 (SB 3) on Thursday. This a great bill that proposes a constitutional amendment to the voters of Kentucky. If adopted, the amendment would move Kentucky's statewide elections to even number years, in unison with Presidential elections. This would save the state \$3.5 million dollars and counties \$13 million dollars. It's a fiscally responsible measure that will both alleviate voter fatigue, and increase voter en-

agement in the election of our state Constitutional Officers. Senate Bill 11 (SB 11) also passed favorably on the Senate floor this week. SB 11 provides recourse for property owners to pursue legal action for intentional damages done to residential rental property.

It would classify intentional or wanton destruction, defacement, or damage to such property as criminal mischief under Kentucky Law.

SB 3 and SB 11 will now head over to the House for consideration.

As we head into the

third week of the 2020 Regular Session, your input is greatly appreciated. Kentuckians have many avenues to follow the General Assembly throughout the session, including seeing legislative action in person here in Frankfort, or viewing online at KET.org/legislature.
