

Quarles: Grilling Kentucky Proud burgers in honor of Beef Month

With more than a million beef cows, Kentucky boasts largest beef cattle inventory east of the Mississippi River and the eighth-most in the nation as the state celebrates Beef Month. "With the weather warming, I urge Kentuckians to join me by throwing some locally-

sourced burgers on their backyard grills in honor of May as beef month," Agriculture Commissioner Dr. Ryan Quarles said. "Beef is not only good for you as part of a healthy, balanced diet, but buying Kentucky Proud beef is good for the state's economy, keeping your

hard-earned money right here at home." Kentucky is home to 38,000 beef cattle producers according to the National Agricultural Statistics Service. The Commonwealth is 14th in the nation for the total number of beef cows and calves with an inventory of 2.13 million

Beef is important to Kentucky's economy with over half of our farms raising cattle

head as of January 1. Kentucky produced more than 594 million pounds of beef last year valued at over \$648 million. Beef cattle sales accounted for more than \$692 million in cash receipts to Kentucky producers in 2019 and gross income of over \$703 million. Barren County reigns as the top county in Kentucky in the total number of cattle and calves, as well as

beef cows. Madison and Pulaski counties follow in the rankings for cattle and calves. The counties flip-flopped in beef cows, with Pulaski in second place and Madison third. The Kentucky Department of Agriculture helps producers find new markets for their cattle, conducts beefcattleshows, tracks market prices, and pro-

ects Kentucky's herds from disease. To find out more about the Department's services, go to www.kyagr.com. NOTICE FROM GREEN COUNTY CLERK IN REGARDS TO 2020 PRIMARY ELECTION

There will be a few changes to how the upcoming June 23rd primary election will be conducted due to COVID-19. The option to vote an absentee ballot will be expanded to include every voter. Here are the ways you can vote by absentee:

Absentee by mail: You can contact my office by phone (or email) to request an absentee application. We will then mail you the application to sign. Once you mail us the application back, we will mail you the ballot.

Absentee by drive-up: For this election, you can pull up into the courthouse parking lot and call us to request an absentee. We will bring you the application to sign, then bring you the ballot and envelope. Once you have it filled out and placed into the secured envelope, we can pick it up from your vehicle.

Absentee by pick-up: For this election, you can also call us to have your application ready and you can pick it up and sign it at our window. We will then give you the ballot and envelope. Once you fill it out and put it in the secured envelope, you can then drop it back off with us at the window.

Absentee online: For this election, you can apply for an absentee ballot using the State Board of Elections online portal. This portal will be available starting May 22nd. Once you put all of your info into the portal and submit it, my office will then mail you your ballot within 3 days. If you choose this option, you will not have to sign an application. This will be the quickest option.

Absentee in-person: Starting June 8th, you can vote absentee in the office by appointment only. When you call us to make your appointment, we will tell you a time to be here to vote and we will have your application ready for you to sign at that time as well. Voting equipment will be sanitized between each voter.

Voting on Election Day: PRECINCTS WILL NOT BE OPEN AND RESULTS WILL NOT BE SEPARATED BY PRECINCT. The only place to vote on Election Day will be the COURTHOUSE. This polling location will still be open from 6am-6pm on June 23rd, but voting by absentee will be the best option.

In order to avoid having a large crowd on Election Day, we encourage everyone to take advantage of the expanded absentee options. This will help prevent long wait times and a large crowd at the one polling location. If you have questions, please give us a call!
