

Kentucky Dairy event

Judge Executive John Frank worked side by side with community members to load vehicles Monday morning. A steady line of cars looped through American Legion Park pausing momentarily for a volunteer to load a food box. 1,248 boxes were loaded with an assortment of dairy products, meat, and produce arrived in a semi-truck early Monday morning. Green County was the 27th county to have a food box drive-in, hosted by the Kentucky Dairy Development Council, Lexington. This program is funded by the Coronavirus Food Assistance Program.



FFA officers masked up, along with all volunteers, and loaded more than 1,200 boxes of food into Green County residents' vehicles. The Green County Cattleman's Association, Extension Office, FRYSC, dairy farmers, and local government officials were present to help load boxes.
