Shares Trick-Or-Treat Precautions

Some traditional Halloween activities are riskier than others due to COVID-19. However, if you will be trick-or-treating this weekend, there are several steps you can take to make it a safer experience for all, per the CDC.

1. Reduce direct contact. The CDC recommends avoiding direct contact (if possible) with trick-or-treaters and giving treats outside. Setting a station up with individually prepared bags is preferred. All should wash hands before handling treats and wear a mask when handing out, preparing or receiving treats.

2. Wear a cloth face mask, and make it part of your costume. Costume masks aren't a substitute. Anyone who has difficulty breathing and children younger than 2 years old should not wear a mask.

3. Stay away from people not from your household. Practice social distancing (six feet apart), whether indoors or outdoors.

4. Clean your hands. Use hand sanitizer after touching surfaces or other people. Make sure to wash your hands with soap and water for 20 seconds before eating Halloween treats.

If trick-or-treating is off the holiday list due to health concerns, you can still enjoy Halloween by:

Decorating or carving pumpkins

Visiting a pumpkin patch or corn maze

Hold a Halloween movie night indoors with household members or outside with friends and neighbors.

**Deep-Sea Corals Get
Treat This Halloween**

In the pitch-black, bone-crushing depths of the Gulf of Mexico is a cast of creatures fit for a Halloween costume party.

Vampire squid, headless chicken monsters, catsharks, sea spiders, and grouper mingle with one another thanks to the deep-sea coral habitat that plays host to such rare, vibrant gatherings. Spooky as some of these species may seem, such deep-sea dwellers have far more to fear from humans. Harmful fishing gear and energy extraction activities can permanently damage ancient corals, which could take decades to recover, if they do at all. However, a new rule published by the National Marine Fisheries Service will help safeguard these precious habitats.

Coral Amendment 9 will protect 484 square miles of deep-sea coral hotspots in the Gulf of Mexico as Habitat Areas of Particular Concern—a status that highlights priority areas for conservation, management, and research efforts. Fishery managers can recommend measures to avoid adverse impacts from activities like oil and gas drilling. Damaging fishing gear can be restricted in most of the areas, while trolling and hook-and-line fishing, which don't affect the ocean floor where these corals live, will be permitted.

Thanks to this forward-thinking action we can count on deep sea corals to host these important, sometimes creepy, marine life menageries for countless Halloweens to come.

**CF To Offer Cares Act
Scholarships**

College of Central Florida is offering scholarships for short-term, in-demand programs intended to address the negative economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. This effort is funded by a recent \$505,000 Rapid Credentialing Grant award from the state of Florida as a part of the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act. Individuals who are out of work or who want to reskill or upskill may qualify to attend CF with no tuition expenses.

The programs - which align with open positions in high-demand, high-wage jobs in our region - include Accounting Technology Specialist, Computer Information Data Specialist, Lean Six Sigma Green Belt, and Logistics and Transportation Specialist. The College Credit Certificate programs are for entry level students, range from 9 to 12 credits and can be completed in 18 weeks or less. They must be completed in spring 2021, though some may start earlier. Most are available fully online.

CF will offer virtual information sessions on, Nov. 9, Nov. 20 and Dec. 2. Individuals who attend a session will have the \$30 application fee waived. Details are available at www.CF.edu/Essential.
