

Some school districts have offered take-home packets of work for students and par-



"I also want to recognize all district support staff who have stepped in to assist the students of their districts under these challenging circumstances."

MDE will submit a waiver to ED regarding suspension of assessments and accountability for the 2019-20 school year. The Council of Chief State School Officers (CC-SSO) is providing needed national leadership by working with ED on state waivers.

"I want to thank CCSSO for its leadership in working with the U.S. Department of Education on a potential waiver for states. CCSSO is leading in unprecedented times," Wright said.

The MDE will send guidance to districts on how to submit information on missed days.

Lawmakers passed legislation to authorize districts to pay all certified and non-certified staff during school closures due to the COVID-19 outbreak. Districts will continue to receive their monthly MAEP allocations
