She is on the front lines of providing comfort, assurance and service during a time of "shelter in place." Diffey says she and her coworkers at People's Drug Store in Lexington are adapting during social distancing. They are being more accessible over the phone, handling transactions through their business' front door and remain an anchor in their community. "We're giving people peace of mind, they know we're here," said Diffey. "It's a stressful time for both patients and us. We are working to keep everyone healthy." Macy the dog (pictured above with her handler Toni Lawshe) is a sweetheart, a pal, a friend, a comforter, and also a live-in resident at Lexington Manor. Veteran citizens at the facility remain on lock-down, meaning no visitors, no family, no outside traffic is allowed through the facility amidst the COVID-19 pandemic. All this to protect some of Lexington's most vulnerable. Cue Macy, a furry companion that makes her rounds everyday going from room to room seeing all her extended family. Macy doesn't even need a leash to perform her duties. Arriving as a stray at the end of 2009, Macy was adopted by all staff, residents and visiting family. Macy is a hero by simply being a friend.

Mike McBride is managing more than just groceries at Sunflower in Lexington. Operating an "essential" business, while many others are closed in the county, Mc-Bride and his team are in the spotlight for supplying many in Holmes County. Adapting to social distancing practices has prompted new service practices like curbside grocery pick-up and increased sanitizing efforts. A 26 year veteran with Potter and Sims Foods, McBride said keeping the store stocked for his community is priority. "I haven't seen a situation like we're in now other than during Hurricane Katrina, a sustained long-term situation," said McBride. Adapting and meeting needs of many people is just another day's work.
