

Senate approves Gold Star Families Week Resolution authored by Hyde-Smith

Sept. 20-26 designated to honor families in lead up to Gold Star Mother’s Day

The U.S. Senate late Thursday, July 30, approved a resolution introduced by U.S. Senator Cindy Hyde-Smith (R-Miss.) that establishes Sept. 20-26, 2020, as “Gold Star Families Remembrance Week” to honor the families of fallen members of the Armed Forces. Gold Star Families Remembrance Week is a designated national period to honor the families of U.S. military servicemembers who lost their lives in ser-

vice to the nation. The week precedes Gold Star Mother’s Day, which is observed on the last Sunday of September. “With the passage of this bipartisan resolution, I encourage everyone to commit to doing everything they can to recognize, honor, and assist the families of the fallen and veterans,” said Hyde-Smith, who introduced the first-ever Gold Star families week resolution in 2018. Until passage of Hyde-Smith’s 2018 resolution, there was no formal recognition on a national level of the sacrifices made by families of the fallen. The Senate-passed resolution (S.Res.664) encourages Americans to perform acts of service and good will to honor “the families of members of the Armed Forces who made the ultimate sacrifice in order to defend freedom and protect the United States, and the families of veterans of the Armed Forces.” U.S. Senators Mike Braun (R-Ind.), Ted Cruz (R-Texas), Joni Ernst (R-Iowa), John Hoeven (R-N.D.), Doug Jones (D-Ala.), Jackie Rosen (D-Nev.), Chris Van Hollen (D-Md.), Elizabeth Warren (D-Mass.), and Todd Young (R-Ind.) cosponsored S.Res.664. Gather all of the items together now and keep them all together in one safe and easily accessible place. “You shouldn’t wait until an evacuation order is given to put together an evacuation kit,” said Commissioner Tom King, Southern Transportation District. “When a hurricane threatens, many times supplies are limited and hard to find. To ensure your family doesn’t go without, gather your emergency supplies in advance.” With the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, residents

should also plan to pack items needed for their protection. Face masks, hand sanitizer, gloves and disinfecting wipes are a few supplies people can add to their evacuation kits to help keep everyone safe. 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“NOTICE OF A PUBLIC BUDGET HEARING ON THE PROPOSED BUDGET AND PROPOSED TAX LEVIES FOR THE UPCOMING FISCAL YEAR FOR THE CITY OF LEXINGTON”

The City of Lexington will hold a public hearing on its proposed budget and proposed tax levies for the fiscal year 2021 on Monday August 17, 5:30 p.m., at the City Hall located at 112 Spring Street, Lexington, MS.

The City of Lexington is now operating with projected total budget revenue of \$1,118,725. \$360,000, or 32.18% of such revenue is obtained through Ad Valorem Taxes. For the next fiscal year, the proposed budget has total projected revenue of \$ 1,115,021. Of that amount, 32.29% or \$360,000 is to be financed through a total ad valorem tax levy.

The decision to not increase the ad valorem tax millage rate for the fiscal year 2021 above the current fiscal year’s ad valorem tax millage rate means you will not pay more in ad valorem taxes on your home, automobile, tag, utilities, business fixtures and equipment and rental real property, unless the assessed value of your property has increased for the fiscal year 2021.

A millage rate of 52.75 will produce the same amount of revenue from ad valorem taxes as was collected the prior year. The millage rate for the prior year was 52.75.

Any citizen of the City of Lexington is invited to attend this public hearing on the proposed budget and tax levies for the fiscal year 2021 and will be allowed to speak for a reasonable amount of time and offer tangible evidence before any vote is taken.
