Misleading solicitations

- Require a fee.
- Cite specific Mississippi
- Contain a due date for your response.
- Appear similar to a government form.
- Contain a "Customer ID Number" that does not match a number given to you by a State or Federal Agency.

Rice harvest is approaching in the Mississippi Delta, and early signs point to good yields in 2020.

State University Extension Service and an assistant professor with the Mississippi Agricultural and Forestry Experiment Station, said the condition of the state's estimated 150,000 acres of rice looks "very good" as growers prepare to fill their combines. 
