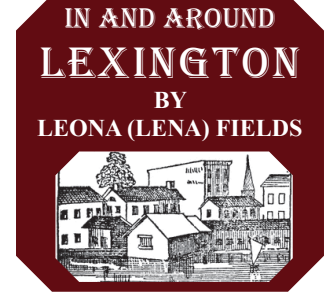
She was born and raised and lived most of her life in Tchula, MS. Many also knew her as "Bargo". Nell Parker was a strong Christian woman and a lifelong
