bers. This also begins a new four-year term for all members.

One of the first orders of business is to elect the Speaker. I was tremendously honored to be elected unanimously by the members of the House to serve the people of my district and the state of Mississippi for a third term as Speaker of the House – a position that I do not take lightly or for granted. Since passage of the teacher pay raise during the 2019 Legislative Session, it came to our attention that the legislature was not provided with the complete information from the Mississippi Department of Education regarding the number of teachers from each district. This error from MDE resulted in a miscalculation for certain districts, which led to a deficit in teacher pay raise.

My first order of business after being sworn in as Speaker of the House was the passage of HB1, officially titled "Additional Funding for Teachers' Salaries." On Wednesday, January 8, the Mississippi House of Representatives passed HB1, the very first bill of our 2020 session, to correct this almost \$18.5 million discrepancy and to fulfill our promise to raise the pay of all Mississippi teachers.

Next Items on the Agenda

With the ceremonial procedures of this new term behind us, my next pri-ority as Speaker of the House will be to begin assigning members to House committees, as well as appointing committee chairmen. Once the committees have been formed, my office can then begin referring bills to the various committees. Every bill dropped by a member of the House must first be voted on and passed out of the committee to which it was referred before it can be brought to the floor for a vote. This process deserves much thought and consideration to ensure that each member is placed where he or she has the best experience, as well as an interest in their committee. I am confident these committee assignments will be completed in a timely manner so we can move forward and begin working on the passage of legislation - more importantly, legislation on the issues important to the people of Mississippi.
