New Paramedic starts at EFPD

The Edgerton Fire Protection District (EFPD) just hired Thomas Colloton to fill an open Paramedic position on its EMS force.

Colloton told commissioners at their regular board meeting at the fire station on March 12, 2020, "My wife and me thought it was time to get back to the area we grew up in, and I'm happy to be back."

Deputy Chief of Operations Jason Russ introduced the newcomer to the board, saying, "We're very fortunate to have Tom, as he has a background that was ready-made for this position. Not only had he served in Orfordville, but in Tomah he was the single Paramedic provider, and that gave him an incredible amount of responsibility and opportunity to serve and grow.

"Besides that," Russ continued, "working at Janesville, he's affiliated with Mercy Hospital, which is a big plus for us, because he's already certified and can hit the ground running."

As if to prove his point, Russ vouchsafed,"In fact, since Tom started the week of March 2, he's been working on all three shifts!"

Colloton moves into a position that had been vacant. Russ and staff had been conducting a set of interviews designed to fill that position plus create a list and ranking system that could be kept in the event they needed to hire another qualified candidate in the near future.

It turns out they were farseeing, because this list is immediately useful, especially considering the fact that another career paramedic, Josh Finn, had just last week

resigned.

Russ explained, "As you know, we've been looking at candidates, and Tom was at the top of our list, especially with his sole service as paramedic up in Tomah, his other EMS background and, as I've said, his current affiliation with Mercy.

Chief Pickering then after brought to the board's attention its previous authorization to have him look into an out-of-cycle pay increase for Career Paramedics.

"Though we understand," Pickering disclosed, "that we won't be able compete with larger metro services and their pay structure, we want to stay current and offer more incentive to retain our talent."

Board members recalled past discussions on revising the pay structure for, particularly, Career Paramedics, deciding to approve a memorandum of

understanding with the union that would implement the new

pay structure next pay period. Pickering told the board that they'd use the list of ranked candidates to call the second

person on that list and offer the position to them.

Candy Davis, Secretary-Treasurer, made the motion to move ahead to fill that position, with Evan Sayre supporting it. Unanimously, the board approved the "go-ahead."

Pickering told the commission that the number of emergency calls were "reasonably un-normal" for the last month of February, clocking in at 76, yielding a year-to-date total of 144. Comparatively, that figure is up 6.9 percent over 2019.

Lastly and on a cautionary note, the chief briefly discussed his attendance at the MABAS Wisconsin Winter In-Service gathering, which featured both the National Weather Service and U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. The two federal agencies were there to forewarn first-responders on the likelihood of future flooding throughout Wisconsin.

"There are three drivers

to this scenario," Pickering informed. "The first is the ground moisture content: the ground is just very saturated, so the water table is high. Second, they warned that Lake Michigan, as well as other Wisconsin lakes and the Mississippi River, are all at record levels. Not record levels from the past ten years but, record levels since records were first started.

"And the third factor is the expected rain itself. Since any rain won't be able to seep into the ground, and the rivers and lakes are already high, the water won't have any place to go and will back up real fast."

Having dealt with flooding issues on what seems a regular basis over the last few years, this was something municipal representatives on the EFPD commission didn't want to hear

Regardless, forewarned is forearmed, and commissioners thanked Pickering for his update as the bearer of potentially bad news, bracing themselves for the inevitable.

Take a stroll on Tuesday March 31, National Walking Day. Listen to some music. as listening to songs with 120 beats per minute has greater benefits to your walking.




