## Wondering how to file for unemployment benefits online?

The Department of Workforce Development (DWD) is encouraging people to go online for faster service delivery. DWD's Unemployment Insurance Division is experiencing heavy call volume and longer than normal wait times.

For employees: The majority of people applying for unemployment benefits can complete their claim online. Receiving unemployment benefits is a two-step process:

(1) Apply online - The week you become unemployed, file your application online and do not wait to file. For more information, instructional videos, and to apply, please visit https://dwd.wisconsin.gov/uibe n/apply/

(2) File your weekly claim After you have applied online, you will need to file a claim certification each week. This will require you to answer a se-

ries of questions. You must continue to file a weekly claim certification for each week you would like to receive benefits. You can find more information at https://dwd.wisconsin.gov /uiben/handbook/english/con tentspart3.htm.

### **Emergency guidance on remote** notarization issued by DFI

At the direction of Governor Tony Evers, the Wisconsin Department of Financial Institutions (DFI) issued emergency guidance pertaining to remote online notarization in Wisconsin.

"Due to the COVID-19 public health emergency, remote online notarization is now authorized in this state, subject to several safeguards to ensure the integrity of the notarial process," said DFI Secretary Kathy Blumenfeld.

Remote online notarizations must be performed using technology providers that are regulated under standards that meet or exceed the safeguards set by

Wisconsin Act 125. DFI has approved four remote online notarization providers thus far: Notarize.com and NotaryCam, which provide remote notary services to the general public. and Pavaso or Nexsys, which provide them for title companies and other real-estate transactions.

"This action is necessary to provide relief to the people of Wisconsin who are following guidance to contain the spread of the COVID-19 virus and are in need of notarization services today," said Blumenfeld.

# Local job centers, partners respond to COVID-19

The Southwest Wisconsin Workforce Development Board (SWWDB) and several partner agencies are temporarily modifying service delivery approaches to help protect customers and staff in response to the COVID-19 outbreak.

Effective March 17, 2020, the Rock County Job Center and its outreach sites are altering workshops, events, large group activities and some limited one-on-one or face-to-face activities consistent with recent CDC guidelines. Group activities such as FoodShare Employment and Training (FSET) and Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act (WIOA) orientations and workshops will be handled via videoconferencing, whereby one moderator will handle the session for all sites and counties. Participants will receive a link to access the webinar remotely, or they can call in to participate in the we-

The Rock County Job Center remains open to the public and will offer limited services and one-on-one appointments. At the time of this Press Release the Resource Room at the Rock County Job Center remains open to the public. However, people-gathering restrictions will apply and customers may be turned away to comply with the 10 person limit. Please expect wait times and time limits. To ensure the health of all customers and staff the management team requests everyone to follow CDC guidelines and State orders, which can be found here: www.cdc.gov/coro navirus/2019-ncov/down loads/workplace-school-andhome-guidance.pdf and Mass Gathering Restrictions.

As a precaution, if you need to meet with a caseworker, career planner or career specialist, please call them first. Many Job Center staff are working remotely and will not be available for drop-in visits. All visits will be conducted as efficiently as possible to comply with social distancing and exposure control guidance.

SWWDB's Platteville Office is not open to the public at this time, but staff will be working onsite and can meet with customers who have preplanned appointments that cannot be conducted via phone or virtually. SWWDB's Beloit offices are closed, with those services moved to the Rock County Job Center.
