"You don't have to look very hard to find something that the club has contributed to," Holland said. "Since 1988, the club is approaching a million dollars in donations. I'm very proud of what the club has been able to accomplish over the years."

"Anybody is invited to attend the meetings," Holland said. "The club has been in existence a long time, and we do a lot of good things to help different programs."
