In 1969, Southwest Georgia Academy (SGA) was but a dream. For over a year, SGA's founding fathers, Hal Haddock, Henry Haddock, J.W. Willis, Lynn Pullen, and Charles Bridges traveled the state in search of the answers to make their dream a reality.

In February of 1970, registration for SGA'S first students began as did the interviewing and hiring of the school's first teachers and headmaster. W.T. Henry of Colquitt was hired as head of school as were eighteen teachers consisting of Anngene Gibbs, Margaret Arnold, Henrinell Middleton, Pat Bridges, Martha Dozier, Vivian Morton, Libby Pridgeon,

Martha Jordan, Mary Thompson, Emogene Jarvis, Mildred Tarver, Edna Sessions, Naomi Bruner, Ruby Still, Suzanne Felder, Sibbie Smith, Joy White, and Carolyn Widner.

On September 1, 1970, Southwest Georgia Academy opened its doors to approximately 365 students in grades 1-11. The 12th grade was added in 1971, and SGA graduated 33 students in its first graduating class.

This year, SGA celebrates its 50th year of promoting educational excellence with 417 students and as such Governor Brain Kemp has declared September 1st as Southwest Georgia Academy Day.
