Iconic local restaurant officially closing its doors

BLADON SPRINGS – One of the county's most iconic businesses, Bobby's Fish Camp, is closing its doors after more than six decades in operation.

Located on the Tombigbee River, just off U.S. Highway 84 near Bladon Springs, the restaurant was built in 1956 by Bobby Dahlberg and his sister Mary, along with her husband. The

restaurant originally served three meals per day to workers who came to the area to build what is now the Coffeerville Lock and Dam, as well as the bridges and highway.

Bobby operated the restaurant until his death in 2010 when his daughter, Lora Jane Dahlberg McIlwain, continued to operate the business.

While the restaurant is closing for meal service, other facets of the business will operate as usual.

"The Bobby's Fish Camp family would like to thank our customers and especially our dedicated weekly friends and neighbors for your business," McIlwain said. "The time may come in the future that we may open the restaurant again. Until then, Bobby's will continue to offer cold drinks, beer, etc. The R.V. Park, Cabins, boat launch, gas/diesel, and Yacht docking will operate as usual. Please call 251.754.9225 for assistance and booking."
